Paris, October 22, N.S.

N the 15th the Queen was churched with the usual Ceremonies. The fame Day the King reviewed near Manly Beringhen's Regiment of Horse. On the 18th the Venetian Ambassadour had a publick Audience, to take Leave of his most Christian Majesty, the Orieen, and the Children of France. The same Day the Spanish Ambassadours had private Audiences to compliment their most Christian Majesties on the Birth of the Dau-phin; as had likewise the Marquels de Rangoni, Envoy Extraordinary of the Duke of Modena. The Parliaments of France have written Letters of Congratulation to the King upon the Birth of the Dauphin, instead of sending Deputations as was formerly practiced, which the King has been pleased to dispense with.

Hague, Oct. 21, N.S. The Chevalier Ossorio, who has resided here for several Years as Minister from the King of Sardinia, having had his Audience of Leave of the States General, will fet out To-morrow for Turin; from whence he is to go to England, his Master having already appointed him as Minister there; he is to be succeeded here by Count Cujane, who it is said will have the Character of Envoy from his Sardinian Maje-fly. Admiral Perez and Sig. Toledano, Mi-nifters from the Emperour of Morocco to the States General, are arrived in these Provinces, and are daily expected here; it is faid that they come with the Characters of Ambassa-dors. Yesterday the States General received an Express from the Texel with Advice that AdmiralSomeIsdyck was arrived from Spithead with the Ships under his Command belonging to this Republick. This Day Brigadier Sutton went to Rotterdam to embark for England in one of His Majesty's Yachts.

Kensington, October 12. Yesterday M. Reichenback; Resident from the King of Prussia, had a private Audience of his Royal Highness the Duke:
