THE Dutchess de Sforce is made Lady of Honour to her Royal Highness the Dutchess Dowager of Orleans. The Abbot de Colnac is made Dean of St. Germain l'Auxerois. The Marquess de Merinville is lately dead in this Town. As is likewise M. d'Ombrevail, formerly Lieutenant de Police. The Son of the Duke de Charost Bethune has taken the Habit of a Priest, and is retired to the Seminary of St. Sulpice. M. de Salis, Captain in the Regiment of Guards, is lately dead. The Count d'Hunolstein, Marshal of the Dutchies of Lorrain and Bar, and Envoy Extraordinary from the Duke of Lorrain, had a private Audience the 23d past of the most Christian King, to compliment his Majesty on the Birth of the Dauphin. Baron Spaar, Ambassadour and Plenipotentiary of his Swedish Majesty at the Congress of Soissons, is set out from this Place with his Lady for Sweden. M. de Lamoignon, President a Mortier, died the 28th past. As did likewise the Dutchess of Richelieu, Mother of the Duke of Richelieu. Count de Druy, Lieutenant of the Horse-Guards, being dead, is succeeded in that Command by M. de Moland. King Stanislaus and the Queen his Consort, who had passed some Days incognito at Versailles, on a Visit to her most Christian Majesty their Daughter, set out last Week to return to Chambord. During their Stay at Court, the King was with them frequently in the Queen's Apartment. The Court will be some Part of December at Marly.
