Paris, November 9, N.S.

ON the 7th Instant her most Christian Majesty arrived here about Noon, and proceeded directly to the Cathedral of Notre Dame, there to return Thanks to God for the Birth of the Dauphin. After Service her Majesty dined at the Tuilleries, and in the Evening went back to Versailles.

Hague, Nov. 11. The Morocco Minister, Admiral Perez, having presented to the States General a credential Letter from the Emperour his Master, and demanded first Twelve and then Eight Florins a Day for his Subsistence with his Retinue; the States have sent him for Answer, that their Consul at Gibraltar having informed them that another Minister from that Prince to the Republick had lately landed there, they could not admit him, nor allow the said Subsistence till the other was arrived, or that they should hear again from the Consul on that Matter. Count Zinzendorf, the Emperour's Envoy Extraordinary here, gave on the 4th Instant a great Entertainment on Account of the Emperour's Anniversary of St. Charles's Day. The Duke of Ripperda's Son, with his Lady, is lately arrived from Groningen, to stay here six Months for the Benefit of the Air, the Lady being indisposed. The Pensionary is very ill of the Gout, and is reckoned to be in Danger. The States have nominated M. de la Fontaine to be Governour of the Cape

of Good Hope, in the Room of the Governour lately deceased. Baron Sthleinitz, the Duke of Wolfenbuttel's Minister, and Plenipotentiary, set out from hence on the 6th Instant for Paris.
