On the 22d the House attended his Excellency the Lord Lieutenant at the Castle with the following Address of Thanks to His Majesty, which his Excellency has transmitted to England, in order to be laid before His Majesty, viz.

To the King's most Excellent Majesty,

The humble Address of the Knights, Citizens and Burgesses in Parliament assembled.

Most Gracious Sovereign,
WE your Majesty's most loyal and dutiful
Subjects the Commons of Ireland in Parliament assembled, beg Leave to return our most sincere and hearty Thanks to your Majesty for your most gracious Answer to our Address.

It is with unspeakable Pleasure we find, that our Professions of Zeal and Affection for your Majesty's Person and Royal Family, have been received with Satisfaction by your Majesty. The Confidence so good and gracious a Prince is pleased to repose in them, is the highest Reward of the Sincerity with which they are made, and a further Motive to engage us upon all Occasions to make them good.

The Assurances your Majesty has most graciously given us, call upon your faithful Commons of this Kingdom to do every Thing that may contribute to the Ease and Honour of your Majesty's Government; and we beg Leave to assure your Majesty of our constant and zealous Endeavours to deserve your Royal Protection, and the Continuance of that Care and Concern which your Maje,sty has expressed for the Welfare and Happiness of your People of Ireland.
