Paris, November 16, N. S.

Yesterday her most Christian Majesty came to the Opera at Paris. On the 12th Instant the Parliament of Paris was opened with the usual Ceremonies. The Archbishop of Paris officiated at the Red Mass, so called from the Magistrates appearing that Day in their Red Robes. The Archbishop was afterwards received Duke and Peer in the Parliament, upon which Occasion the first President gave a great Entertainment. M. Denis, Treasurer General of the King's Buildings, is dead lately, and succeeded by his Son. The Prince d'Issenguen, who has been very ill, is much better. M. Blouin, Governor of the Palace of Versailles, is dead.

Hague, Nov. 18, N. S. The States of the Province of Holland have been assembled here since Wednesday last. During this Session they will dispose of several Military and Civil Employments vacant within their Repartition; they will likewise take into Deliberation the Petition of the Council of State, upon the Establishment and Estimates of the Military Forces for the next Year, which in all Likelihood will be the same as for this present Year. The Great Pensionary being in a pretty good State of Health, will, in a few Days, assist in their Assembly. M. Hop, Envoy from the States General to the King of Great Britain, set out from hence on the 16th Instant to embark for England.
