THIS Morning the States General received by an Expreſs from their Ambaſſadours at Paris an Account, that the Treaty of Peace and Friendſhip concluded between the Crowns of Great Britain France and Spain, was ſigned at Seville by the reſpective Miniſters Plenipotentiaries of thoſe Crowns on the 9th of this Month. It is believed M. Vander Meer Miniſter of the States at the Court of Spain, received about the Middle of this Month his full Powers from their High Mightineſſes, by Virtue of which he will concur in the ſaid Treaty. The Great Penſionary has been ill of the Gout and of a Fever, but is now pretty well recovered. The States of the Province of Holland are to aſſemble on the 9th of next Month.
