'exacted' the fourth penny of every mans Effate. Our Letters from Cologne tell us, that Emmerick and Rees are taken by the French , the latter by Storm; and that Nimmegen and Schinkscance are belieged; and its faid, the first is taken, and the other upon Surrender, and that the Bishop of Munster hath raken Groll and Borhelo; And that his most Christi. an Majefty hath put Rhynbergh into the poffession of the Elector of Cologne. The Letters from Treves tell us, that there lately passed there 100 great Barges laden with Wood and all forts of Materials for making of Bridges towards the Army. 'By feveral petfons arrived from Amsterdam, we are told, that the confusion and consternation there, is beyond ex. preffion; That the States have raised all Taxes a fourth part, having ordered that eight Guilders shall be paid for every Chimney, among which are to be reckoned, all Ovens, Furnaces, Stills for hot water, Oc. That every Servant pays now two Guilders to the State, who paid but one before.

By an Expleis arrived this Morning we have ad-vice, that Skinkfoonce is taken, as likewile Graves, and that the French Army is marching towards the Mey, y of Bon le duc, though on what particular delign is not known. We hear that in one of the Places lately taken by the French, there were 1300 Men in Garrison, but that upon the approach of the French Troops, the greatest part run away, and left the reft to Surrender.

Oftend, June 15. By divers Veffels arrived here from Zealand, we have advice that feveral Dutch men of Wat are come in there miferably to and thatter'd, and amongst others, Lieu. Admiral Van Ghent's Ship, who hath above 200 Men killed and 60 wounded, Van Effe's Ship Vice-Admiral of Rotterdam, young Everson's Ship, the Haes of Amfter dam, as likewile Cap. Brachel's Ship, who have all loft abundance of Men; we are certainly informed that de Ruyter lost above 200 Men on board his own Ship; and the Dutch themselves confess that they have loft more Men in this Engagement | then in any two Battels during any former War; all the Hospitals at Terveer, Uliffing, and Middleburgh are now crowded with wounded Men, fo that notwithstanding all the extravagant reports that have been spread abroad in Holland, of the advantage they had over the English in this Engagement, the people begin to be very sensible of the contrary, and cannot be longer kept from knowing that their Fleet is extreamly torn and dilabled, feveral Ships loft, and great numbers of Men killed, which puts them in great confusion. The Dutch Fleet is at them in great confusion. prefent of Ds burgh, within three Leagues of *uliffing*, where they are forced to by to repair, as hardly daring to come into Port, for fear of the people, who they now endeavor in fome measure to pacifie, by telling them their Fleet is at Sea. That the Seamen that come 'rom the Fleet, complain . of their hard Service, and are very unwilling to go back gain That on Friday last the Fiscael went to the Fleet, in order to the trial of several Captains, who they fay, have not behaved themfelves as they ought in this Engagement.

Tarmouth, June 7. This Evening arrived here a Ketch belonging to this Town from Rotterdam, which had been Arrested there at the begining of the War, the Master tells us, that upon the Fleets being Engaged, it was reported there, that the French Squa-Aron had run, and that they had coopt up the English Fleet in Sole Bay, and thereupon beat up their Drums for Men, in order to their purfuing this Victory, by which Artifice they got more Men those two .days, then they have been able to get ever fince.
