Dresden, February 22, N. S.

THE King of Prussia arrived here the 18th, about Ten a-Clock at Night, attended by Count Seckendorff, General Grumkow, and two or three other Officers; he went directly to Count Truch's, and then came to Court, and assisted at the Celebration of the Marriage of the Countess Cosel. The two Kings embraced, and sat down at Table with the Company, which consisted of about fifty Persons. After Supper there was a Ball, and the two Kings stayed till Three in the Morning. The King of Prussia lay at Count Truch's, and the next Day his Polish Majesty prevailed upon him to accept of a Lodging in his Palace. The same Day their Majesties both dined and supped together, and the Morning following review'd a Part of Count Rudowsky's Regiment, and afterward His Prussian Majesty dined with the Count; and Yesterday at General Wackerbach's; and at Night was present at the Entertainment which his Polish Majesty gave to finish the Carneval. To-morrow his Prussian Majesty sets out on his Return for Berlin.

Berlin, Feb. 28, N. S. On Saturday last the King of Prussia returned to Potsdam from Dresden, and this Day at Noon his Majesty came to Town.

Paris, March 4, N. S. The Abbey de Moustier St. Jean, in the Diocese of Langres, vacant by the Death of the Abbot de Thesut, is granted to the Bishop of Langres, in Consideration of some Part of his Diocese that had been dismembred to form that of Dijon. The Count de Luc, Brother to the Archbishop of Paris, and formerly Ambassadour in Switzerland and at Vienna, is very ill. The

Marquess de Crevecoeur is dead. The Duke de Caderousse is dead in a very advanced Age. On the 2d Instant the Court received Advice by a Courier from Rome, that Pope Benedict the 13th died the 21st past, N. S.

Hague, March 7, N. S. M. de Ginkel is arrived here, and will forthwith set out for Berlin. General Hompesch is likewise arrived, and is to have the Command of the Encampment which is to be formed near Nimeguen. The Council of State has already ordered 180 Florins for each Company of Foot and Horse, being half the Money given for Waggon, the other half being commonly paid at the End of the Campaign. The Province of Friesland being much indebted to the Cash of the Generality, a Deputation of three Gentlemen, M. Vander Hoym the Treasurer-General being one of them, are gone this Day for Friesland, to press that Province to pay their Arrears.
