WE your Majesty's most dutiful and loyal Subjects, the Commons of Ireland in Parliament assembled, beg Leave to congratulate your Majesty upon the happy Conclusion of an absolute Peace with Spain; a Peace, which we doubt not, through your Majesty's Goodnels, to reap the Benefit of in common with the rest of your Subjects: The more we think of the Miseries of a War (at best uncertain in its Event) the more we are led to admire your Majesty's Wisdom, in obtaining for us the Blessings of Peace, and the Increase of Trade, and Riches the Consequence thereof.

As we have had, through the whole Course of your Majesty's Reign, many and great Instances of your Goodness towards us, we cannot omit on this Occasion, to return you our most sincere and hearty Thanks for your constant and unwearied Care for the Welfare and Prosperity of your Subjects.

Under the Government of so good a Prince, we shall endeavour to make ourselves an happy People, by taking all Opportunities of approving ourselves your Majesty's most dutiaful and loyal Subjects.

The Preparations for the intended Encampment in the Neighbourhood of Nimeguen, are carried on with Diligence, a great Number of Tents having been already made for the Officers and Soldiers, and all the Officers are ordered to repair to their respective Regiments by the 25th of this Month. Some Companies of Swils are to come hither, to serve in the Room of the Foot Guards, who are to march to the Encampment, as are also the Horse-Guards, who are to be relieved by some Troops of Dragoons. Captain Schryver, who lately arrived in the Texel from the Mediterranean, with the three Men of War under his Command, has been nominated to return to Algiers with two Men of War, and with the Presents from the States General to that Government. Instructions are drawing up for M. de Ginkel, who 'tis faid is to fet out forthwith for Berlin.
