Ditto, We have just now advice, that Scenck scance is taken by Storm, most of the Garrison having been put no the Sword ; and that the French have likewife taken Aernhem, but of this we must expect to hear farther; in the mean time here arrive daily feveral perfons with their Goods and Families from Holland, where they speak the confusion to be fo great amongst the people, that they seem almost ready to quit their Towns, so soon as they hear of the approach of the Enemy; Several Passengers arrived from Tergow, tell us, that the Boores were got together in Arms, to the number of 4000, and were refolved not to permit the Country to be fet under Water, which could not be done without their utter ruine, and that they had much rather submit to the French, then deftroy themselves. The Bishop of Munster hath certainly taken Swol and feveral other places.

Middleborough, June 20. On Friday last arrived at Ulissing Vice-Admiral Cornelis Everson with two men of War to repair, having on board feveral wounded Men; the common people are very diforderlyhere, and nothing can fuffice but a revenge upon their Magistrates, whose houses they plunder, and put themselves often in danger of their lives; many Vessels arrive here with Goods and People, who fly out of *Holland*, where the Enemy is alrea-dy advanced into the heart of the Countrey; thtrecht we hear very readily fubmitted to his molt Cheistian Majesty, having refused to receive into the Town, the Souldiers which the States would have fent them for their greater fecurity; It is certainly faid that Acrnhem and Nimmegen are befieged, and here comes just now a report, that the former is taken by the French ; we have had some discourse here, as if the Elector of Brandenburgh and fome other Princes of Germany, were sending us a powerful assistance, but it is feared, that this is but a vain hope, with which we ende wor to flatter our selves there being as yet not the least appearance of the coming down of those Troops. Our Fleet lies still off of Domburgh, about three Leagues from Uliffing.

Amsterdam, June 20. It is hard to defcribe the fad condition we are here in, every minute we pais, is in danger of being plundered and murthered by the Commonalty, who now take libert# to fay and doe whatever they pleafe without sontroul : Dort hath its faid refolved to defend it felf to the laft, and to that end, are going'to fet the Countrey round under wafer, and at Rotterdam they would begin to -put themselves into some posture of defence, though to little purpose, the discouragement amongst the people being fo great, that it is thought the first approach of the Enemy will frighten them from all refolution of defending themselves; we are told that the Allembly of the States will for the future be held here, and that all Persons of Quality and many other people are removing from the Hague hither ; our Magistrates have it is said, opened the Gates in the night, and caufed feveral Chefts with Money to be conveyed out, which the people ex- Itream ill, her recovery being wholly despaired of."

treamly murmure at ; at Rotterdam, Leyden, and Delft the Commonalty have been extream jude and tumultu us, being hardly kept from offering vio-lence to their Magifirates; at *litrecht* the Women fell upon their Burgomaster, plundered his house, and very severely handled his Person; so that what through our confusion at home, and the near approach of our Enemies from abroad, we know not where to feek for any fafeiy, and what stian Majesty, who hath, as is said, likewise tak n Amersford, and may now be on his match towards Amsterdam; His Highness the Prince of Orange was two days fince with his Army, confilling of 10 or 12000 Men near Wourden, and is now incamped hard by Leyden ; yesterday Prince Maurits arrived here, and this day the Heer van Beveren was made Governor of this place, during the prefent danger; all kind of Victuals as Butter, Cheefe, Oc. b gin to be extream dear ; at Rotter dam have been fitted out four men of War, which however, shall not be fent to Sea, but employed for the fecurity of the Maes; Here have been likewise fitted out fix or eight men of War, who are ordered to continue in the South Sea, for the fecurity of those parts. Our Fleet lies still off of #liffing.

Rotterdam, June 21. His most Christian Majesty gains every day fo much upon us, that we are become like people deprived of all reason, th- People tumult, and cry out against their Governors, whom they feem justly to accuse of having been the occasion of what they are now reduced to; *Utrecht* hath submitted to the French, who we hear are now within three Leagues of Amfterdam, where, as well as here and all other places, their distraction and confusion is as great as their danger from abroad ; the inland Boars that used to pass between Amsterdam and this place are now ftopt, and all entercoursebegins to be quite interrupted and bruken off; however we continue to fend all our best things to Amsterdam and Zealand, whilft the Inhabitants there fly as fast from thence, it being hard to know where, in thele Provinces, to find a place of greatest lecurity; in the mean time we are endeavouring to put our felves into some condition to be able to defend our felves, and to that end are cutting our Dykes to fet the Countrey round under water, though the Boors are in fome places in Arms, and will by no means permit it, because they must needs be all suined thereby; our Fleet, it is faid, is called home, though we hear they lye still off of Uliffing ; we are certainly affured, that they have yet II men of War miffing fince the late engagement with the English, and that they had near 7000 Men killed and wounded, but this cannot be certainly known, it being kept very fecret.

Brmflels, Fune 21. From Liege we hear, that the French had drawn most of their Forces out of Tongeren, Mafeyck, Gc. and had approached Maestricht with intentions to block it up, and that to that end they expected 10000 Men more from the French Army. Two days fince arrived here the Count de Montgomery, Nephew to the Mareichal Turenne, on the part of his most Christian Majesty, and had his Audience and dispatch upon Sunday; it is faid, his Errand was to defire paffage through the Spanish Territories for 10000 Men, who are to march to the French Army. On Saturday last the young Counts Tilliers, two Brothers, were aflaffinated at Mons by 7 or 8 Spaniards, as they were coming out of Church; the Countels d' Egmont is ex-

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
