Vagabonds, and others.

An Act for continuing feveral temporary Statutes made in this Kingdom and now near expiring, and for the Amendment of other

Statutes therein mentioned.

An Act for allowing further Time to Perfons in Offices to qualify themselves, pursuant to an Act, intituled, an Act to prevent the further Growth of Popery.

An Act for the better Discovery of Judgments in the Courts of King's Bench, Common Pleas, and Exchequer at Dublin, and for the greater Security of Purchasers.

An Act to enable his Majesty to purchase in

the respective Interests of the several Perfons intituled to the Houses and Grounds adjoyning to the new Parliament House.

An Act for the further explaining and amending several Statutes for prohibiting Under Sheriffs and Sheriffs Clerks from officiating as Sub-Sheriffs or Sheriffs Clerks more than one Year; and to render more effectual an Act to prevent Fees being taken in certain Cases, and to take away the pretended Office of Barony Clerk, and to oblige Sheriffs to appoint Deputies for granting Replevins, and also for discharging of Prisoners unable to pay their Fees.

An Act to prevent unlawful Combinations of Workmen, Artificers and Labourers, employed in the leveral Trades and Manufactures of this Kingdom, and for the better payment of their Wages; as also to prevent Abules in making of Bricks, and to afcertain their Dimensions.

An Act for the more speedy Tryal of Criminals in the County of the City of Dublin.

An Act for the better regulating the Fees of Justices of the Peace, and for disabling Alderman Thomas Wilkinson and Alderman Thomas Bolton from acting as Justices of the Peace within this Kingdom.

An Act for the better enabling the Governors of the Work-House of the City of Dublin to provide for and employ the Poor therein, and for the more effectual punishment of Vagabonds; and also for the better securing of and providing for Lunaticks and Foundling Children.

An Act for repairing the Road leading from the City of Dublin to Kilcullen Bridge, in

the County of Kildare.

An Act for repairing the Road leading from the City of Dublin to the Town of Navan, in the County of Meath.

An Act for the Relief of Infolvent Debtors. An Act for cleanling the Ports, Harbours and Rivers of the City of Cork, and of the Towns of Galway, Sligoe, Drogheda, and Belfast, and for erecting a Ballast-Office in the said City, and each of the said Towns.

An Act for explaining and amending an Act made in the Sixth Year of the Reign of his late Majesty King George the First, intituled, An Act for erecting and continuing Lights in the City of Dublin, and the se-

veral

Cities of Cork and Limerick, and Liberties thereof.

An Act for finishing and regulating the Hos-pital founded by Richard Stevens, Esq; Doctor of Phylick.

And to Five private Bills.

After which his Excellency made the following Speech to both Houses.

My Lords and Gentlemen, H Aving obeyed his Majesty's Commands in giving his Royal Affent to the Laws you have prepared, I shall now put an End to this Session of Parliament, in which you have given most remarkable Proofs of your Duty and Affection to his Majesty's Person and Government, and have shown a true Care and Concern for the Ease and Prosperity of your Fellow Subjects. I make no doubt, but you have received the greatest Satisfaction in observing, that the Bill for Encouragement of Tillage and better Employment of the Poor, so well calculated to increase the Trade and Riches of this Kingdom, hath received fuch an Addition, by his Majesty's having been graciously pleased to remit his hereditary Duties upon the Exportation of Wool and Yarn, as must lay a Foundation to make the Effects of that Act still more beneficial and extensive.

This Instance of His Majesty's Desire to promote the Manufactures of his Kingdoms, cannot but produce the highest Returns of Duty and Assection from all his Subjects.

Gentlemen of the House of Commons, I am commanded by his Majesty, to return you Thanks for the Supplies you have granted for the Support of the Esfablishment, and for making so effectual a Provision for the National Debt. It must contribute very much to the Honour of this Parliament, that, at a Time when you were railing new Funds to make good the Deficiencies, you were able to reduce the Interest of the former Debt, with a due Regard to parliamentary Credit, and to raile the Money, which the publick Service required, at an easier Rate than hath hitherto been known in this Kingdom; and I am perswaded that the immediate Application of those Sums to the Purposes for which they were intended, has been entirely to your Satisfaction.

My Lords an l Gentlemen,

I can make no doubt, but on your Return into your several Countries, you will in your respective Stations, act in such a Manner, as may most effectually promote his Majesty's Service and the publick Tranquility.

I am glad to fee the Condition of the Kingdom so much altered, that a Prohibition against the Exportation of Corn is become no longer necessary: And I hope by a due Execution of the Law now paffed for encouraging of
