Vienna, April 15, N. S.

COUNT Nostitz has received the Golden Key, and taken the Oaths as Chamberlain to his Imperial Majesty. On Tuesday last Count Lanckynski, the Russian Envoy Extraordinary, notified in Form to their Imperial Majesties, the Dutchess of Courland's Accession to the Imperial Throne of Muscovy. On Wednesday the Emperour held a Council of State, and in the Afternoon gave Audience to several Persons of Quality.

Berlin, April 22, N. S. Yesterday Count Lennard, the Saxon Envoy, returned Home. And next Monday M. Louenhor, the Danish Minister, is expected here. The Queen of Prussia, who has been indisposed, recovers Strength every Day. On the 29th of next Month his Prussian Majesty will set out for Dresden, to see the Encampment there.

Dresden, April 26, N. S. The King of Poland is returned hither from Fraustadt. His Majesty has signed the Universalia for the Diet to be held at Grodno in October next, and declared the Palatine of Trock, M. Oginski, Palatine of Vilna, by which Post he is the third Senator. The Regimentary Count Poniatowski was at Fraustadt, as was also his Brother in Law Prince Czartorinski Vice-Chancellor of Lithuania, who went both away very much dissatisfied at their not being able to obtain that Palatinate for the Father of the latter, who is Castellan of Vilna. The Grand Marshal of Poland is on the Road in his Way hither from Warsaw, to stay during the Encampment; as is also Prince Wiefnowieski Great Chancellor and Regimentary of Lithuania. His Majesty has named General Wackerbach to be his Felt Marshal in Saxony, and made the President of the Conistory M. Bunow Privy Councillor, and given the Presidency to M. Lohs, Brother to the Master of the Horse to his Majesty. Great Preparations are making here for the intended Encampment, which remains fixed for the 1st of June, and the Grand Review to be that Day; but it is generally believed that it will be put off till the Middle of that Month, it being impossible

that all can be got ready sooner. The King of Poland goes to Leiplick Fair on Friday next, and as is said will not return hither till the Encampment is formed; all the Court will attend his Majesty thither, as will also the Foreign Ministers.

Paris, May 3, N. S. The Count d'Ulez, Lieutenant-General and Governour of the Island of Oleron, is lately dead. A General Assembly of the Clergy is to be held the 25th of this Month in the Church of the Grand Augustins at Paris. The Count de Montgomery, the oldest Marshal de Camp, is dead. The Parliament which has been at Fontainebleau by Order of the King, is returned.
