Whitehal June 23. Is Majesty having in pursuance of the Election of the Right Honeutrable Henry Earl of Arlington, His Majellies Principal Secretary of Stare, on the 15 instant, into the fellowship of the most Noble Order of the Garter, appointed his Grace the Duke of Ormand, and the Right Honourable Henry Earl of 8. Albahr, Lord Chamberlain of his Majesties Houf hold, his Commissioners, to install the said Earl the Ceremony was accordingly performed yesterday the 22 instant in the Chappel of the Castle of Windfor in the usual manner; the faid Earl of Artingzon having by reason of his abs nee had the Right Honourable Sir Robert Carr, Knight and Bartonet, Chencell r of the Duteny of Luncaster, his Proxy, For this occasion: the Ceremony being ended, the Lards Commissioners and Proxy, together with divers persons of Quality and the Officers or the Of der, were entertained at a very iplendid Dinner at the Lart Chamberlains Lodging in the Cattle, at the Charg of the laid Barl of Arlington.

From the Cump near Dierent on the Rhyn, June 16. The 73 initant the Prince of Orange having learnt Phrat the Fresheh were passed the Rhyn into the Betrawe, was forced to quit this passage, and to retire with his Army in great disorder towards utrecht, at the fame time the Mareshal Turenne (who now Commands the Prince of Conde's Army during his Indisposition) marched towards Aernhem, which Place he made himself Matter of the next day, without any confiderable loss fave the Count de Pleffor, who was unluckily killed by a Canon Buller, fome few Minutes before the Surrender of the place; yesterday the said Mareshal attacked with the said Horces, the Fort of Knotzenburgh, otherwise called the F re of Nimmegen, which he took this evening, forthat re is thought, the Town it self will not be able to hold out many days; His Majesty tipon his arrival h re, was pleased to give Audience to the Deputies of the Town of Aernhem, which they had lent fince their Surrender, to beg the conumuance of their Priviledges, &c. which it is faid his Majetty hath Gratiously granted them; The Bi-shop of Munster, together with the Duke of Luxemburghalies at present with his Troops before Deven-Ber, and his Majesty hath sent out a party of Horse and Poot to attack Doesburgh, and to morrow his Majesty intends to march with his whole Army that way; We fiear that the Prince of Conde advances apace in the recovery of his Health, so that he may be very suddainly in a condition to appear again at the Head of his Army, It is said, that 10000 Men three coming from the Conquered places in Flunders, go recruit the Army, in lieu of the leveral Garrison, that have been put in the many places, that are already fallen into our hands.

On Munday last happened here a great turnelt amongst the Inhabitanes, in which nothing would satisfic them but the killing and plundering the Buggermaster and other chief Officers of the Town, which they would certainly have done, had not their condescention to their demands prevented them; the particulars are, The Burgermafter having promised the Burgers, that there should be held that day, which was Monday, a Council of War, and that the Magazines should be opened, that so they might see what store of Ammunition there was, it leems afterward changed their mind, and Int that morning to the leveral Captains of the Burghers, or Train-Bands, to let them know, that they had affairs of more importance in hand, and that the Council of War fhould be put iff untill another time, which so inraged the Commonalty, that they immediately met together in multitudes before the Magistrates house, as likewise besore the Ruwaert van Putten's houle, (Brother to the Pensionary de Witt, and sate Plenipotenniary on Board the Dutch Fleet) and would doubtless have glickly pulled them to the ground, but that the faid Rumaers fent them word, that at 14 of the clock that morning they would meet at the Townhouse, and consider what was fit to be done for the giving them all the fatisfaction, they could, desires accordingly at the time appointed all the Lords met, all the Burghers presently flacked thither, some with Arms and some without, and made themselves master of the Town-house; several of the Captains of the Burghers, went into the place where their Lordships were met, and told them, That they were resolved to defend the Town to the last, but that it should be under the conduct of the Prince of Orange, either himself, or such he should appoint their Governor, and therefore that their Lordships befor they parted must take an oath to be true and feithful to the Prince, and acknowledge him for their G vernor; the Lords feeing the danser they were to, in case they result, d, ant less conser they were to, in case they result, d, ant less conserted to a light and immediately declared these.
