**O**N the 14th Instant the General Assembly of the Church of Scotland met at Edinburgh, and chose for their Moderator Mr. William Hamilton. His Majesty's Commission to the Right Honourable the Earl of Loudoun was read; as was likewise his Majesty's most gracious Letter to the Assembly. His Majesty's High Commissioner made a Speech to the Assembly, which was answered on their Part by the Moderator; and a Committee being appointed, drew up a dutiful Answer to his Majesty's most gracious Letter; which having been transmitted by the Moderator to his Grace the Duke of Newcastle his Majesty's Principal Secretary of State, has by him been presented to his Majesty, who was pleased to receive it very graciously.

His Majesty's High Commissioner's Speech to the General Assembly of the Church of Scotland.

*Right Reverend and Right Honourable,*  
**Y**OU are met together in this Assembly under his Majesty's Protection, to deliberate upon what is proper to be done in your Capacities for the promoting of true Religion, and to concert the Measures that may best conduce to the Peace and Welfare of the Church, the Advancement of Piety and Virtue, the preventing the Growth of Popery, and the suppressing of Prophaneness and Immorality.

These are the great Ends of your Meeting, in which you have always us'd your most sincere and hearty Endeavours.

The Assurances the King has been pleased to give you in his most gracious Letter of his Approbation and Concurrence in whatever may effectually answer these good Purposes, must be very agreeable to you, and encourage you more and more in the Pursuit of them.

That you may be the better enabled to prevent the Growth of Popery and Ignorance in the Highlands and Islands, his Majesty has been graciously pleas'd to renew his Warrant for One thousand Pounds for the Entertainment of Itinerant Ministers and Catechists in the Countries, to be managed and accounted for in the Manner as in the Warrant which is in my Hands. I hope by the Blessing of God you have made some Progress there, in teaching those People Religion and Loyalty, and that you will continue to take Care, that the pious Purposes for which it is granted, may be still farther carry'd on.

I have received his Majesty's Commands to assure you, that he is very sensible of the steady Adherence of this Church to the Succession of his Family, and to the Protestant Interest in general, and that he has an entire Confidence in your Loyalty.

I am authorized by the King to tell you,

that it is his Majesty's fixt and determin'd Resolution, inviolably to maintain the Presbyterian Government of the Church of Scotland in the full Enjoyment of all its Rights and Privileges.

*Right Reverend and Right Honourable,*

His Majesty has been graciously pleased to confer upon me the Honour of representing his Royal Person in this Assembly.

The Proofs you have given of your Zeal for his Majesty's Service, and your Conduct in former Assemblies, particularly in those where I had the Honour to represent his present Majesty and his Royal Father, have encouraged me to undertake this great Trust, in which the Prudence that prevails in all your Consultations will be a great Assistance to me in discharging it with Fidelity to his Majesty, and a sincere Regard to the Interest of this Church.

Your hearty Dispositions to the Good both of Church and State, the Unanimity, Moderation and Brotherly Love, that I am confident will appear in your Proceedings, and cast a Lustre upon them, together with the Equity and Justice of your Decisions, and the Dispatch of Affairs to come before you, cannot fail to bring this Assembly to a happy Conclusion, and afford me the Pleasure of giving a good Account of it to his Majesty.

We are deeply sensible, that the preserving that Unanimity, Moderation, Charity, and Brotherly Love, which become such an Assembly, in all our Debates, is so necessary, that the Success of our Counsels does intirely depend upon it, and we should be inexcusable if we did not endeavour it to the utmost of our Power.

We have had so many Proofs of the Capacity and Abilities of the Earl of Loudoun, and his Qualifications for the Discharge of so great a Trust, of his Zeal for your Majesty's Service, and his Affection and Concern for this Church, as render your Majesty's Choice of him to represent your Royal Person in this General Assembly most agreeable to us; and we esteem it an Evidence of your Majesty's Royal Goodness to this Church, and shall reckon it our Happiness, if by the Prudence which shall prevail in our Consultations we can be assisting to him,

We humbly presume to take this Opportunity of acknowledging, with the greatest Thankfulness, your Majesty's Royal Bounty, in renewing your pious and charitable Donation for Reformation of the Highlands and Islands; it is with great Pleasure that we can assure your Majesty, that the Application thereof in former Years hath produced very good Effects, and we hope it shall still produce more; and for that End it shall be our Care faithfully to employ it to the good and laudable Purposes for which your Majesty hath been pleased to grant it, and in an exact Conformity to your Majesty's Royal Orders.

May our gracious God, who hath placed your Majesty upon the Throne of your Ancestors, as a great Blessing to these your Dominions, and to all the Protestant Churches, long preserve you to reign over us, and bless your Counsels for the publick Good, with much Prosperity and Success. May He long preserve and abundantly bless your Royal Comfort the Queen, his Royal Highness the Prince of Wales, and all the Royal Family; and after a long and happy Reign on Earth, may He bless you with a Crown of Glory in Heaven, and may there never be wanting a Prince of your Royal House to sway the Scepter over us. **T**HIS Court being informed, that of late Years at the usual Season of Resort at *Tunbridge-Wells* in this County, several unlawful Games called *Fairchance*, *Faro* and *Ace of Hearts*, and other unlawful Games, contrary to the Laws and Statutes of this Realm, are there carried on, exercised and supported, and several Persons attend to support the same who are not known to have any visible Way of Living, to the great Disturbance and Damage of His Majesty's good Subjects resorting to and frequenting the said Wells for their Health, or other Occasions: For preventing which Mischiefs and Disorders, and suppressing the said unlawful Games for the future, it is thought fit and ordered by this Court, that it be recommended to the several Justices of Peace of this County of the Division wherein *Tunbridge-Wells* lie, or who shall be there residing, to assemble and meet together as often as there shall be Occasion, and to take and use such lawful Means as may be most effectual for preventing any of the said unlawful Games at the Places aforesaid, or any Riots or Rours occasioned thereby; and the Constable, Borsholder, and other Peace-Officers of the Parish of *Speldhurst*, and other Parishes in this County where *Tunbridge-Wells*, or the Houses or Buildings thereunto adjoining is or are situate, are hereby required to be aiding and assisting to the said Justices of Peace, as they and every of them will answer the contrary at their Peril. And the said Constables, Borsholders, and other Peace Officers, are hereby farther ordered to give publick Notice of this Order, by affixing Copies thereof in the most notorious Places near *Tunbridge-Wells* aforesaid: And it is farther ordered by this Court, that this Order be printed and published in the *London Gazette*, for the better Notification thereof, and that no Person may pretend Ignorance.
