We have had fo many Proofs of the Capacity and Abilities of the Earl of Loudoun, and his Qualifications for the Discharge of so great a Trust, of his Zeal for your Majesty's Service, and his Affection and Concern for this Church, as render your Majesty's Choice of him to represent your Royal Person in this General Affembly most agreeable to us; and we esteem it an Evidence of your Majesty's Royal Goodness to this Church, and shall reckon it our Happiness, if by the Prudence which shall prevail in our Confultations we can be affifting to him.

We humbly prefume to take this Opportunity of acknowledging, with the greatest Thankfulness, your Majesty's Royal Bounty, in renewing your pious and charitable Donation for Reformation of the Highlands and Islands; it is with great Pleasure that we can aslure your Majesty, that the Application thereof in former Years hath produced very good Effects, and we hope it shall still produce more ; and for that End it shall be our Care faithfully to employ it to the good and laudable Purposes for which your Majesty hath been pleased to grant it, and in an exact Conformity to your Majesty's Royal Order's.

May our gracious God, who liath placed your Majesty upon the Throne of your Anceftors, as a great Bleffing to thefe your Do-minions, and to all the Protestant Churches, long preferve you to reign over us, and blefs your Counfels for the publick Good, with much Prosperity and Success. May He long preferve and abundantly blefs your Koyal Con-fort the Queen, his Royal Highnefs the Prince of Wales, and all the Royal Family; and after a long and happy Reign on Earth, may He blefs you with a Crown of Glory in Hea-ven, and may there never be wanting a Prince of your Royal Houfe to fway the Scepter over us. HIS Court being informed, that of late Years at the ufual Seafon of Refort at Tunbridge-Wells in this County, feveral unlawful Games called Fairchance, Faro and Ace of Hearts, and other unlawful Games, contrary to the Laws and Statutes of this Realm, are there carried on, exercifed and fupported, and feveral Perfons attend to fupport the fame who are not known to have any vifible Way of Living, to the great Diffurbance and Damage of His Majefty's good Subjects reforting to and trequenting the taid Wells for their Health, or other Occasions: For preventing which Milchiels and Diforders, and supprefling the faid unlawful Games for the future, it is thought fit and ordered by this Court, that it be recommended to the feveral Juffices of Peace of this County of the Di-vision wherein *Tunbridge-Wells* lie, or who fhall be there refiding, to affemble and meet together as often as there shall be Occasion, and to take and use such lawful Means as may be most effectual for preventing any of the faid unlawful Games at the Places aforefaid, or any Riots or Routs occasioned thereby ; and the Constable, Borsholder, and other Peace-Officers of the Parish of Speldhurft, and other Parishes in this County where Tunbridge-Wells, or the Houses or Buildings thereunto adjoyning is or are fituate, are hereby required to be aiding and affifting to the faid Juffices of Peace, as they and every of them will answer the con-trary at their Peri<sup>1</sup>. And the faid Constables, Borshol-ders, and other Peace Officers, are hereby farther ordered to give publick Notice of this Order, by affixing Copies thereof in the most notorious Places near Tunbridge-Wells aforefaid : And it is farther ordered by rhis Court, that this Order be printed and published in the London Gazette, for the better Notification thereof, and that ho Perlon may pretend Ignorance. Custom-house, London, May 28, 1730. Whereas Robert Kneale, Commander of a Boat em-ployed in the Service of His Majesty's Customs as Whitehaven, and Three of his Boatmen, were at the House of one John Hill, an Innkeeper in Ryall, near Annan in Scotland, opposite to the English Coast in the Port of Carlifle, waiting for the Tide to bring up their Boat, upon the 22d of April last, in the Night, and while they were in the said House, it was forced open by a Mob, who in a very violent and barbarous manher beat and dangeroufly wounded the faid Kneale and his Men, and carried away their Arms: The Com-miffioners of His Majefty's Cuftoms do hereby give No-tice, in purfuance of the Directions of the Rt. Hon. the Lords Commiffioners of His Majesty's Treasury, That if any Person or Persons shall be the Means of discovering and apprehending the Offender or Offenders, fo as that he or they may be projecuted and brought to con-dign Punishment, he or they shall have a Reward of Fifty Pounds, to be paid by the Receiver-General of the Cuftoms, upon the Conviction of the Offenders.
