Moscow, May 4, O. S.

ON the 28th of last Month the Czarina was crowned with much greater Pomp than any of her Predecessors; the next Day in the Afternoon all the Foreign Ministers had a publick Audience in great Ceremony. The 1st Instant they were all invited to a Collation which her Majesty gave them in the Garden of her Summer Palace; afterwards there was a Ball which lasted till about Eleven at Night, when her Majesty went through the principal Streets of this City to see the Illuminations that some of the Ministers had made before their Houses. The Duke of Liria, Ambassadour from the King of Spain, having illuminated a Triumphal Arch, her Majesty ordered her Coach to stop before his House, that she might have Time to examine the Pictures, and Emblems of the Illuminations, which made a magnificent Show. Her Majesty has given to Baron Osterman a very considerable Estate, in Livonia, which formerly belonged to Prince Menzikoff, and has conferred the Title of Count on him. Her Majesty has likewise given Felt-Marshal Prince Gallitzin a very large Estate about 100 Miles from this Place; and has declared Count Lewenvolde Great Master of her Household. Her Majesty's intended Journey to St. Petersbourg seems at present to be suspended.

Canitz, near the Camp at Muhlberg, June 3, N. S. His Polish Majesty, accompanied by the Knights of the White Eagle, went on the 31st of last Month about a League from the Encampment in their Drels of the Order, to meet the King of Prussia, with 32 Coaches, each drawn by six Horses, and between 80 and 100 led Horses, with Coverings of yellow Velvet richly embroidered, besides several Mules; and when they approached the King's Quarters, the Way was lined with a Regiment of Janissaries (as they are called) on one Side, the Cadets and four independent Companies on the other. The next Day was the grand Review, when the whole Army was drawn out in two Lines before the Camp at Six a-Clock in the Morning, and after the two Kings had passed before the Lines, they went into the Tents that were placed in the Front of the Army, when there was a triple Discharge of the Cannon, and a general running Fire repeated three Times, which was extremely well performed; then the Troops began to march off before their Majesties in Grand Divisions and Sub-Divisions, which lasted till Five in the Evening. Yesterday their Majesties dined together in private. This Day the Dragoons are to perform their Exercise.
