Moscow, May 18, O. S.

THE Empress designs to go to Morrow to Ilimoyloff, one of her Majesty's Country Seats about 40 Miles from this Place, where she will reside for some Time. The two Regiments of Guards, which consist of 7000 Men, are encamped near that Place. Before her Majesty returns to Moscow, she has resolved to go Forty Miles on Foot in Pilgrimage to the Monastery of Troitra (or the Trinity) to pay her Devotion there, which most of her Predecessors have usually done upon their Accession to the Throne. Her Majesty will be attended in her Pilgrimage by a Battalion of her Guards, and Tents are to be pitched at every two or three Miles distance, her Majesty not intending to go farther a Day. Yesterday her Imperial Majesty invested Count Wratiflaw, Ambassadour from the Emperour of Germany, with the Order of St. Andrew.

Moscow, May 25, O. S. Yesterday the Czarina set out for Ilimoyloff. It is said the Camp near that Place, which now consists of 7000 Men, will be increased with several marching Regiments, which with the Guards will make a Body of 17500 Men, and that they are to stay there as long as her Majesty remains at that Place.
