THE King of Poland has been very much out of Order with a sore Throat, and kept his Bed a Day or two, but was Yesterday a good deal better.

Hague, July 28, N. S. Count Degenfeld arrived last Night at Rotterdam with his Lady, and the Prussian Minister is gone this Morning to wait on him there. He intends to embark with the first fair Wind for England. M. de Neubourg, one of His Royal Highness the Prince of Wales's late Governours, having the King's Leave, designs a Voyage to England in two or three Days, and intends to embark on board the same Yacht with Count Degenfeld if he stays that Time.
