*Stockholm, July 8, O. S.*

**M.** Pudeweltz, Minister from the King of Prussia, has received his Letters of Revocation, and proposes to take Leave of this Court the latter End of next Month. General Natzmer has got his Son excused from coming hither, and another will be named to succeed M. Pudeweltz. The King of Sweden sets out this Afternoon to take the Diversion of Hunting; his Majesty proposes to go to several Houses more distant, and at last to return by Ekelsund hither, and will, as it is said, be absent at least three Weeks. The Queen goes on Saturday to her House at Droningholm, where her Majesty proposes to drink the Waters during the King's Absence. Brigadier Degenfelt, with several Hessian Gentlemen, is gone to Upsal; he proposes to meet General Vergier on Friday next at Count Horn's, and from thence they are both to go and joyn his Swedith Majesty. A large Ship is now lying at the Bridge, which, it is said, is taken up to carry to Algiers the Swedish Present stipulated by the late Peace between that Government and the Crown of Sweden.

*Copenhagen, July 22, N. S.* The King of Denmark's Progress into Holstein is at length begun. His Majesty set out for Walloe on the 19th, and is supposed to have passed the Great Belt this Morning. The Prince Royal and one half of the Privy Council are left behind. The Evening before the Court left Copenhagen, the Duke of Norburgh Ploen was married to the young Countess Reventlau; whom he carries in a few Days with him into Holstein.

*Hambourg, July 25, N. S.* The King of Denmark is expected at Sleswick on the 27th or 28th, where his Majesty will consult with the famous Doctor Stahl concerning his Health. Count Plelo, the French Ambassador, follows the Court, and will perhaps make a Tour to this Place.

*Dresden, July 25, N. S.* The King of Poland went to Mauricebourg Yesterday, but returned in the Evening, and continues pretty well; 'twas feared his late Indisposition would not have left him so easily, for besides his having taken Cold, he had bruised his fore Foot, which gave him a great deal of Pain, and he was obliged to suffer an Incision. The Electoral Prince has had two or three Fits of an intermitting Fever, but they not being very strong, it is hoped will go off soon. Count Rudowsky and the Chevalier de Saxe set out for Italy on Sunday last.

*Hague, Aug. 1, N. S.* Count Degenfelt, who has the Character of Envoy Extraordinary from the King of Prussia to the Court of Great Britain, embarked at Rotterdam on Sunday last on Board a Yacht. The Assembly of the States of the Province of Holland continues fixed for To-morrow Seven-Night.
