**O**N the 9th Instant the States of Holland assembled here, to resume their Deliberations on Affairs relating to the publick Revenues of their Province. The Commissioners nominated by them to settle the new Tax upon Houses, are preparing to go to the several Towns for that Purpose. The Agreement between the West-India Company and the Zealanders is finally adjusted, the latter having desisted from their Pretensions to carry Negroes to Surinam. Commissioners appointed by the Emperour, the King of Prussia, and this State, are to meet here to accommodate the Differences that have risen about the Tolls collected on the Maese. The Inhabitants of the City and Country of Liege who have lately been molested by the Officers of the Government of the Austrian Netherlands, have obtained from the Court of Vienna the Continuance of their Privileges in Brabant, and such of their Effects as had been seized are ordered to be restored. The King of Prussia was expected to arrive to Day at Wesel. Baron Sparre, Minister from the King of Sweden to the Court of Great Britain, is arrived here with his Lady, and designs to embark at Rotterdam for London the first fair Wind.

the Treaty of Peace with the present Emperour Muley Abdalla, with several additional Articles for the further Security and Advantage of His Majesty's Subjects residing there and trading to those Parts; and he also brought away from thence divers of His Majesty's Subjects, who had at several Times been taken by the Sallee Rovers, and have been now redeemed out of Captivity by His Majesty's Royal Bounty, viz.
