HIS Polish Majesty set out for Warsaw last Night, attended by the Vice-Chancellor Lipsky, his Great Chamberlain Count Frise, M. Briel, and some few others. His Majesty intends to go by the Way of Great Poland, and stop a Day or two at Carge, upon the Frontiers. The Marquels de Fleury and M. Tioli will follow the Beginning of next Week. Count Hoym is excused this Journey, provided his Majesty returns so soon as Christmas, which he has Thoughts of doing, to be present at a Diet in Saxony the Beginning of the ensuing Year.

Whereas two Letters, one subscribed Jon. H. and Tho. J. dated the 5th Instant, and the other subscribed Jon. Resolute, dated the 7th, have been received, by the Penny-Post, by Nathaniel Gould, Esq; one of the Directors of the Bank of England, directed to him at his House in Crosby-Square in Bishopsgate-street, requiring him to come alone to Constitution-Hill and leave Ten Guineas in a Purse under three Bricks which he should find together, within three Yards of the Corner of the Wall of her Grace the Dutchess of Buckingham's Garden, and threatening, in Case of Refusal, or of endeavouring to betray the Person that should come to see if

the Money were there, pursuant to their Demand, that he the said Nathaniel Gould should not long survive. His Majesty, for the better discovering and bringing to Justice the Persons concerned in sending the said Letters, or either of them, is pleased to promise His most gracious Pardon to any one of them, who shall discover his Accomplice or Accomplices, so as he or they may be apprehended and convicted thereof.

And as a further Encouragement to such Discovery, the said Nathaniel Gould does hereby promise, that whoever shall discover the Person or Persons who sent, or contrived or directed the sending of the said Letters, or either of them, so as he or they may be convicted thereof, shall, upon such Conviction, receive as a Reward, the Sum of Fifty Pounds of him the said Nathaniel Gould.

Widow, now residing in _____ is the Widow of _____ who did serve as an Officer of the Land Forces before the 25th of December 1716, and that she was married to him before that Time, and that her said Husband died upon the British Establishment of _____ Half Pay in Quality of _____ on or about the _____ Day of _____ and that to the best of our Belief she still continues the Widow of the said Officer, without any Provision from the _____ Govern-
