**T**HE States of the Province of Holland are to reassemble on the 12th Instant. Last Saturday Morning the French Minister residing here received by a Courier the News of her most Christian Majesty's being brought to Bed of a Prince, which he communicated the same Day to the States. The Saxon Minister has made the like Notification to the States, of the Electoral Princess of Saxony's being delivered of a Son. The Elector of Cologne, incognito, with his Brother Prince Theodore, arrived here last Night. It is said they will stay but three or four Days.

Whereas two Letters, one subscribed Jon. H. and Tho. J. dated the 5th Instant, and the other subscribed Jon.
