THE Elector of Cologne and Prince Theodore his Brother are still here, but design to be gone To-morrow. They have seen what is most remarkable in this Place and its Neighbourhood. They were Yesterday entertained at Dinner by his Excellency the Earl of Chesterfield; and at Night went to a Ball at a Country Seat a League from hence.

Windsor-Castle, August 31.

Yesterday the Chevalier Ossorio, Envoy Extraordinary from the King of Sardinia, received a Courier from his Court, with an Account that his Sardinian Majesty had resigned his Crown, &c. to the Prince of Piemont his Son, and designed to retire to his Castle of Chambery in Savoy; and this Day the Chev. Ossorio had an Audience of his Majesty, at which he presented his Credential Letters from the present King to His Majesty.

Windsor-Castle, August 31.

On the 24th Instant one of His Majesty's Messengers arrived here from Spain, being dispatched by Mr. Keene His Majesty's Minister at that Count, with his Catholick Majesty's Cedula for the South Sea Company's Annual Ship, in the most ample Form.

There came also an Account by the said Messenger, that his Catholick Majesty had appointed the Marquess de Monteleon his Ambassadour to the Court of Great Britain, and that Orders had been sent him to repair thither with all possible Expedition.

Windsor-Castle, August 10, 1730.

Whereas two Letters, one subscribed Jon. H. and Tho. J. dated the 5th Instant, and the other subscribed Jon. Resolute, dated the 7th, have been received, by the Penny-Post, by Nathaniel Gould, Esq. one of the Directors of the Bank of England, directed to him at his House in Crosby-Square in Bishopsgate-street, requiring

him to come alone to Constitution-Hill and leave Ten Guineas in a Purse under three Bricks which he should find together, within three Yards of the Corner of the Wall of her Grace the Dutches of Buckingham's Garden, and threatening, in Case of Refusal, or of endeavouring to betray the Person that should come to see if the Money were there, pursuant to their Demand that he the said Nathaniel Gould should not long survive. His Majesty, for the better discovering and bringing to Justice the Persons concerned in sending the said Letters, or either of them, is pleased to promise His most gracious Pardon to any one of them, who shall discover his Accomplice or Accomplices, so as he or they may be apprehended and convicted thereof.

And as a further Encouragement to such Discoverers the said Nathaniel Gould has hereby promised that whoever shall discover the Person or Persons who send, or conveyed or directed the sending of the said Letters, or either of them, so as he or they may be convicted thereof, shall upon such Conviction receive as a Reward the Sum of Fifty Pounds of him the said Nathaniel Gould.
