Seville, August 25.

THEIR Catholick Majesties set out from Cazalla on the 20th Instant, and arrived at this City on the 23d at Night, where they intend to stop a few Days before they proceed to Port St. Mary's. On the 19th Instant the Court received Advice by an Express from Cadiz, of the Arrival of the Flota in that Bay; computed to be worth Eighteen Millions, Twelve in Money and Six in Goods.

Vienna, Aug. 30, N. S. We have received Advice from Constantinople, that the Grand Signior was marched from thence to take the Field in Person; but that it was supposed he would stop at Aleppo, while his Forces endeavoured to recover the Fort of Tauris: That he had drawn Thirty Six Millions of Pistres out of his Coffers to carry on the War against Persia; and that the Ceremony of his March out of Constantinople lasted from Eight in the Morning till Nine at Night.

Hague, Sept. 12, N. S. The States of the Province of Holland meet to Morrow, the greatest Part of the Members being already come hither. The Grand Pensionary designs to assist at the Assembly. The Directors of the East India Company having been summoned to attend, arrived here two Days ago, and had Yesterday and this Day a Conference with the Deputies of the States concerning the two East India Ships taken and released by the Algerines. The Elector of Cologne and the Prince his Brother set out from hence on Saturday last for Amsterdamb, in their Return to Munster. We have this Day received Advice, that the King of Sardinia has resigned his Government in Favour of the Prince of Piedmont his Son. We hear that the Prince of Orange, who has been for some Time at Aix la Chapelle for the Benefit of the Waters, has been indisposed with a Fever, but that he is so well recovered, that his Highness designed to return very soon from thence.

Whereas two Letters, one subscribed Jon. H. and Tho. J. dated the 5th Instant, and the other subscribed Jon. Resolute, dated the 7th, have been received, by the Penny-Post, by Nathaniel Gould, Esq; one of the Di-

rectors of the Bank of England, directed to him at his House in Crosby-Square in Bishopsgate-Street, requiring him to come alone to Constitution-Hill and leave Ten Guineas in a Purse under three Bricks which he should find together, within three Yards of the Corner of the Wall of her Grace the Dutchess of Buckingham's Garden, and threatening, in Case of Refusal, or of endeavouring to betray the Person that should come to set if the Money were there, pursuant to their Demand that he the said Nathaniel Gould should not long survive. His Majesty, for the better discovering and bringing to Justice the Persons concerned in sending the said Letters, or either of them, is pleased to promise His most gracious Pardon to any one of them, who shall discover his Accomplice or Accomplices, so as he or they may be apprehended and convicted thereof.
