Windsor-Castle, September 10.

**T**HIS Day Count Degenfeld, Plenipotentiary Minister from the King of Prussia, had his first private Audience of His Majesty to deliver his Letters of Credence, to which he was introduced by the Right Honourable the Lord Harrington one of His Majesty's Principal Secretaries of State, and conducted by Sir Clement Cottrell, Kt. Master of the Ceremonies.

He had afterwards a private Audience of the Queen, in her Majesty's Apartment, to which he was introduced by the Right Honourable the Earl of Grantham her Majesty's Lord Chamberlain, and conducted by the Master of the Ceremonies.

Windsor-Castle, Sept. 11. This Day Count Degenfeld had a private Audience of his Royal Highness the Prince of Wales, to which he was introduced by the Master of the Ceremonies.

And was afterwards introduced by him to a private Audience of their Royal Highnesses the Princess Royal and the Princesses Emilia and Caroline.

Windsor-Castle, August 10, 1730.

Whereas two Letters, one subscribed Jon. H. and Tho. J. dated the 5th Instant, and the other subscribed Jon. Resolute, dated the 7th, have been received, by the Penny-Post, by Nathaniel Gould, Esq; one of the Directors of the Bank of England, directed to him at his House in Crosby-Square in Bishopsgate-street, requiring him to come alone to Constitution-Hill and leave Ten Guineas in a Purse under three Bricks which he should find together, within three Yards of the Corner of the Wall of her Grace the Dutchess of Buckingham's Garden, and threatening, in Case of Refusal, or of endeavouring to betray the Person that should come to see if the Money were there, pursuant to their Demand, that he the said Nathaniel Gould should not long survive. His Majesty, for the better discovering and bringing to Justice the Persons concerned in sending the said Letters, or either of them, is pleased to promise His most gracious Pardon to any one of them, who shall discover his Accomplice or Accomplices, so as he or they may be apprehended and convicted thereof.

And as a further Encouragement to such Discovery, the said Nathaniel Gould does hereby promise, that whoever shall discover the Person or Persons who sent, or contrived or directed the sending of the said Letters, or either of them, so as he or they may be convicted thereof, shall, upon such Conviction, receive as a Reward, the Sum of Fifty Pounds of him the said Nathaniel Gould.
