## A PROCLAMATION.

**W**HEREAS James Earl of Findlater and Seafield was duly elected and returned to be one of the Sixteen Peers of Scotland, to sit in the House of Peers of the present Parliament of Great Britain, and is since deceased; in order to the electing another Peer of Scotland to sit in his Room, We do, by the Advice of our Privy Council, issue forth this our Royal Proclamation, strictly charging and commanding all the Peers of Scotland to assemble and meet at Holy-Rood-House in Edinburgh, on Tuesday the 17th Day of November next ensuing, between the Hours of Twelve and Two in the Afternoon, to nominate and chuse another Peer of Scotland to sit and vote in the House of Peers of this present Parliament of Great Britain, in the Room of the said James Earl of Findlater and Seafield, deceased, by open Election and Plurality of Voices of the Peers that shall be then present, and of the Proxies for such as shall be absent, such Proxies being Peers, and producing a Mandate in Writing, duly signed before Witnesses, and both the Constituent and Proxy being qualified according to Law. And the Lord Clerk Register, or such two of the principal Clerks of the Session as shall be appointed by him to officiate in his Name, are hereby respectively required to attend such Meeting, and to administer the Oaths required by Law to be taken there by the said Peers, and to take their Votes, and immediately after such Election made and duly examined, to certify the Name of the Peer so elected, and sign and attest the same in Presence of the said Peers, and return such Certificate into our High Court of Chancery of Great Britain. And We strictly charge and command, that this our Royal Proclamation be duly published at the Market Cross at Edinburgh, and in all the County Towns of Scotland, Twenty five Days at least before the Time hereby appointed for the meeting of the said Peers to proceed to such Election.

*Pera of Constantinople, July 24, O. S.*

The Ceremony that was performed when the Grand Signior marched into Camp at Scutari, going against the Persians, July 23, 1730, O. S.

The Grand Signior, attended by the Vizier and the Pashas, embarking on a Galley, went up to Aiup, where he put on his Sword in Ceremony, according to the ancient Custom; from thence he returned to his Chiosk at Constantinople, and on board the same Galley passed to Scutari about Twelve a-Clock. The Streets from the Scale at Scutari to the Camp, which was pitched in the Plain beyond the Grand Signior's Seraglio at Calcedonia, being in length about two Leagues, was lined with Janizaries, computed to be between 20 and 30000 in Number.

4. The Chaoux, with their Officers.
5. The Chaoux-lar Doagi, or Chaplain of the Chaoux.
6. Chaoux-lar-Katabi, Chaoux-lar-Emini, Secretary and Lieutenant of the Chaoux's.
7. The Chaoux Bashi, or Commander of the Chaoux's.
8. Chourbagis, or Captains of Companies of the Janizaries.
9. Bas Chaoux, --- Orta Chaoux, Two General Officers of the Janizaries.
10. Bas-jalagi, or first Secretary of the Janizaries.
11. Coal-cehaiasi, or Lieutenant General of the Janizaries.
12. Gianifar-Aga, or General of the Janizaries.
13. The Tartars that belong to the Vizier's Guard.
14. The Deli-baslar, or a Guard of the Grand Vizier's, compos'd of the People of Bosna.

A Company of Spahis that belong to the Grand Signior's and Vizier's Guard, bearing Ensigns on the Top of their Spears of different Colours, those on one Hand red, on the other yellow.

16. The Janizaries that compose the Grand Signior's and Vizier's Guard.
