Edinburgh, July 1.

He Scotch Privateers have lately brought three Dutch Prizes into Leith, one laden with Sugars, Indigo, Ge, from the Weft

both defigned from Holland to meet their East India Fleet.

Harwich, July 3. The Dartmouth Frigat hach this day brought in here a Dutch Merchant man belonging to Flushing, Mounted with 12 or 14 Guns, and laden with Sugars from the Weft Indies, which they took going into the Texel.

Copenhagen, June 18. On Wednesday the 12 inftant, his Grace the Duke of Richmond, Extraordinary Ambaffador from His Majefty of Great Brittaine, made his publick Entry here, having been received and Complimented on the part of the King, by Monfieur *skiel*, a Nobleman of great Authority in this Court, and Monfieur Kraegb Mafter of the Geremonies, about a mile out of Town, and fo conducted hither in his Majefties Coach, attended by great numbers of Coaches, as well of the Queen, Prince George, as of the feveral Nobility here, all with fix Horfes apiece ; at his Excellencies coming into the Town, all the great Guns were discharged from the Walls, and the Soldiery drawn up in their Arms, with all other publick demonstrations of an extraordinary respect to his Excellencies Person and Quality; his Grace's Train and Equipage was most Noble and Splendid, confifting of three very rich Coaches with fix Horses apiece, twelve Footmen, and eight Pages, belides Grooms and Trumpetters, who were all in very rich Liveries. On Friday his Excellency after having been four Meals very splendidly entertained at the Kings charge, had his publick Audience of the King, Queen, and Prince, whither he was conducted in the lame manner as is above-mentioned

Paris, Fuly 9. You will certainly have already heard of the taking of Doesburgh, Zutphen, &c. yet notwithstanding, we will not omit giving you an Account of the following Particulars, which we receive from the Camp at Biloin, between Aernhem. and Doefburgh; That the 19 pail the Duke of Roa-'ne? , opened the Trenches before Docsburgh , with the loss of few, Men, though with great danger to himself, four Gentlemen having been killed on his fide, and he himfelf receiving a Musker Shot through his Hat; The 21 as they were going to Storm the place, the Inhabitants fent out to Capitulate, and obtained, that they should all be undisturbed in their Persons and Estates, onely that the Garrison which was 4000 Foot, and 100 Horfe, should be Prisoners at War, upon which they prefently yeilded ; nor any Perfons of Note were killed at this Siege fave the Marquis de Larreylenes, who was killed with a Canon Bullet. The fame day being the al ; Count Conningsmark, Ambassador Extraordinary from the Crown of Smeden, had Audience of his Majeffy, to which he was introduced with the usual Geremo nies. The 22 his Majesty received advice of the ta-

king of Deventer, by the Forces of the Bishap of Munfter; and that Swol, Kampen, Elbourg, Ar-derwycke, Hattem Haffelt, and Ommen, had all yeilded upon the Summons of a lingle Trumpeter, and accordingly, after having driven out the Dutch, received French Garrilons, The 23 his Majefty had Indies, another of 600 Tuns, laden with received French Garrilons. The 13 his Majefty had Victuals, and the third with Ammunition, an Account of the taking of the Forts of Veorne, and Sp. Andre, two very confiderable Posts in the County of Bammet, who both yeilded upon the ap-proach of 300 Horfe onely, which the Yilcount Turenne had fent thither, under the Command of the Sieur d'Apremons; The 24 his Majelty fent & Reinforcement to the Duke of Orleans, who Bea fieged Zutphen; The fame day the Bilhop of Straf-burgh arrived in the Camp, and had Audience of the King; The next day the Bilhop of Muziter arri-ved there likewife, having been prefented to his Majefly by the Sieur de Banneil, with whom he had a long Conference, after which, he again took has leave, in order to his return to his Army, having been presented by his Majesty with a cross of Diamonds of a very great valew. The fame dayabe Baron de Meremiche, Envoy from the Elector of Treves, had likewise Audience of the King; The fame day the Duke de Roans? parted with three Squadrons of Horse for #trecht, and the Viscount Turenne, after having Dined with the King, returned to Nim-megen, which place holds out fill with much obstinacy. At ten that night his Majesty received the news of the Surrender of Zutphen upon conditions, That the Governor with the whole Garrison, in all 3000 Foot, and 250 Horfe, should be Prisoners at War, Oc. The 27 his Majelty parted from Biloin towards Amerongen, where he intended to in-camp, his Majesty having before ordered the Duke of Vendo mes Regiment to be put into Aernhem; The 28 his Majefty arrived at Amerongen. It is faid his Majefty intends to go the 30 inftant for Utrecht, which is onely four Leagues from thence. The 29 the Mareshal Turenne intended to open the Trenches before Nimmegen, not doubting but in a fhort time to make himself Master of that place. The same day the 28 the Sign de Groot arrived in the Camp, with ample power from the States General, and was the next day to have Audience of his Majesty. The third instant the Dutchels d' Enguien was happily brought to Bed of a Son at St. Germains, to the great joy of that Family. At Belde Iste is arrived the Ship called the Crowned Dauphin, from Suratte, from whence the came in Fanuary laft ; we have advice, that about the same time the Sieur de la Haye parted thence with his Squadron on some great defign for the advancement of Trade, and that the King of Tonquin hadgranted the French great immunities, with liberty to Trade and Traffick in any of his Territories.

Amfterdam, July 5. Elere hath been great confufion this week, the Heer Haffetaer our Chief Sheriff, was some days since wounded in a Tumult by a Musker Shot ; and the Burgermaster de Graef, as he was going to the Hagne, to be present there in the Assembly of the States of Messard, on the part of this Town, was very feverely fallen upon by the peo-
