HIS Day their Majesties, with his Royal Highness the Prince of Wales, the Duke, the Princess Royal, and their Royal Highnesses the Princesses Amelia, Caroline, Mary and Louisa, returned from Richmond to relide here.

St. James's, October 29.
This Day Abraham Stanyan, Esq; His Majesty's late Ambassadour at the Ottoman Porte, being returned from Constantinople, waited on His Majesty, and delivered his Recredential Letters from the Grand Signior and Grand Vizier; and His Majesty was pleased to receive him very graciously.

St. James's, October 30.

This being the Anniversary of His Majesty's Birth Day, His Majesty received at Noon the Compliments of the Nobility, Foreign Mini-sters, and other Persons of Distinction. At Night there was a Ball. The Appearance was at both Times very numerous, and extremely splendid. On this Occasion the Guns in the Park and at the Tower were fired, and in the Evening there were Bonfires, Illumina-tions, and other publick Demonstrations of Joy, throughout London and Westminster.

London, October 29. Yesterday Humphrey Parsons, Esq; Lord Mayor Elect for the Year ensuing, was sworn at Guildhall; when the Chair and other Ensigns of Mayoralty were surrendred to

him in the accustomed Manner.

This Day the new Lord Mayor, accompanied by the late Lord Mayor, Aldermen, Recorder, and Sheriffs, in their Scarlet Gowns, went in their Coaches to the Water-Side, the Sword and Mace being carried before them, and the City Officers attending; and from thence proceeded in the City Barge, attended by the several Companies in their respective Barges adorned with Streamers and Pendants to Westminster; and having walked round the Hall and solemnly saluted all the Courts, they went to the Exchequer Bar, and the Lord Mayor did there take the Oaths appointed, and having recorded Warrants of Attorney in the proper Courts, returned by Water to Dorset-Stairs, and from thence in Coaches with the usual Solemnity to Guildhall, where a magnificent Entertainment was provided, at which were present the Great Officers of State, divers of the Nobility, Lords of His Majesty's most Honourable Privy Council, the Judges, and other Perfons of Quality and Distinction.

of the Clock at Night, his said House was set on Fire, and entirely consumed, whereby the Ships at the Key and the whole City were in great Danger of being also fet on Fire; and fince the burning of the said House, two Letters have been conveyed to the said Mr. Packer, threatning, if he ald not leave a larger Sum of Money threatning, if he Ald not leave a larger Sum of Money at a Place appointed, to marther him and his Sisters, to burn every House he should live in, and that the City before it were long, should be all in Flames: For the better discovering and bringing to Justice the Person concerned in a Crime of so high a Nature, and attended with so much Barbarity and Villany, His Majesty is pleased to promise His most gracious Pardon to any one of them, who shall discover his Accomplice or Accomplices, so as he or they may he apprehended and convicted thereof; and also a Reward of One Hundred Pounds to such Person, or to any other Person of Persons making such Discovery as aforesaid, payable upon the Conviction of such Offender or Offenders:
