Paris, November 11, N. S.

Esterday being the Anniversary of the King of Great Britain's Birth-Day, his Excellency the Earl of Walde-grave, His Majesty's Ambassadour at this Court, gave a magnificent Entertainment to a great Number of English on that

joyful Occasion.

Hague, Nov. 14, N. S. The 10th being the Anniversary of the King of Great Britain's Birth-Day, his Excellency the Earl of Chesterfield, His Majesty's Ambassadour here, gave a magnificent Entertainment to all the publick Ministers, and many other Persons of Distinction: The Prince of Nassau-Friseland, who arrived here the Night before, was present at the Feast, with the chief of his Retinue. A Treaty of Peace has been agreed upon with Admiral Perez, between the States General and the Emperor of Morocco, and the Dutch Slaves in Morocco, who are 32 in Number, are to be redeemed at the Price of 300 Crowns each. Yesterday came Advice by the Way of Vienna, of an Infurrection of the Janizaries at Constantinople, who after having caufed the Grand Visier, the Captain Bashaw or Admiral, and others of the principal Officers of that Court to be put to Death, deposed the Grand Signior Achmet, and placed on the Throne his Nephew Machmut, Son of the former Sultan Mustapha. Captain Schryver has made his Report to the States of his Proceedings in relation to the two East India Ships taken and released some Months ago by the Algerines, and their High Mightinesses have approved his Conduct. At the same Time he delivered the Present sent by the Dey to the States, being two Horses and a very rich Saddle. The Marquess de Fenelon is from expected, to reside here in the Room of M. de la Baune, as Ambassadour from the Court of France, the States Passport for his Equipage and Baggage having been transmitted to him some Days ago. We are expecting daily the two Ambassadours of this State who are returning from Paris, a Yacht having been fint to receive them at Ghent.

Whereas in the Month of September last several Lesters were fent to Mr. George Packer, of the City of Briflol, Merchant, and one to his Sisters who lived in his House, requiring that a certain Sum of Money should be left in particular Places described in the said Letters, threatning, if the same were not complied with, to murther them, and to burn his House, and accordingly on Saturday the 3d of October Instant, about Twelve of the Clock at Night, his faid House was set on Fire, and entirely consumed, whereby the Ships at the Key and the whole City were in great Danger of being also fer on Fire; and fince the burning of the Said House, two Letters have been conveyed to the Said Mr. Packer, threatning, if he did not leave a larger Sum of Money threatning, if he did not leave a larger Sum of Money at a Place appointed, to murther him and his Sisters, to burn every House he should live in, and that the City before it were long, stould be all in Flames: For the better discovering and bringing to Justice the Persons concerned in a Crime of so high a Nature, and attended with so much Barbarity and Villany, His Majesty is pleased to promise His most gracious Pardon to any one of them, who shall discover his Accomplice or Accomplices. So as he or they may be apprehended and complices, so as he or they may he apprehended and convicted thereof; and also a Reward of One Hundred Pounds to such Person, or to any other Person or Perfons making such Discovery as aforesaid, payable upon the Conviction of such Offender or Offenders.
