Harwich, July 13.

B have advice here from Holland, that his most Christian Majesty was approached with his Army very near to Herzogenboschs, that he had already taken leveral places not far from y and

of great conlequence to that place, which it is thought would likewise have faln into his Majesties hands, had not the great Rains, which they have had of late in those parts, kept him from stræking it as yet; the fear and want of resolution in the Inhabitants there, being faid to have been fo great, that notwithftanding the great ftrength of the place, and the confiderable Garison they have within, they no sooner heard of the march of the French that way, but they thought it almost time to follow the example of the other places, and to furrender to the King. In the mean time, the Hollanders still hope that the high waters will encourage them to hold out, in cafe of a Siege, which we hourly expect to have an account of.

From Retterdam hath been fent two Companies of Burgers, one to the Brill, and the other to Helvoetfluyce, for the reinforcement of those places, who were no fooner arrived there, but prefently found matter for a quarrel with the Townlmen, which th ugh occasioned but by a flight accident, scarce worth mentioning, yet might have proved of a mischievous confequence, had not the diferetion of fome [immediately put into their hands again, in the fame of the foberer fort used timely means to appeale this diferter.

_ Mathu, June to. All the fe of the French Nation which are of this Order, have obtained leave to go and attend his most Christian Majesty in the War against the Dutch; and are accordingly all parted hence on their inway to France; except thole, who by realish of their age, 'or other infirmities are uncapa-ble of undertaking the expedition. We have been often alarmed here, with the reports of a defign the Turks might have upon this Island, in revenge of the great damage they have neceived from our Galleys in the Arobipelago, but at prefent the march of the Ottoman Forces rowards Poland, feems to fecure us ar gainst any attempts this Summer; notwithstanding it is still reported. That the Captain Bassa will very fuddenly put to Sea with a great Fleet, but without any certainty.

Meffinay Jusie 12. Our Vice-Roy the Prince de Ligne continues itill here, and will do fo molt of this Summer : Through the great endeavors that have been used to upply this place with fufficient quantities of Carn front abroad, we begin to have great abundance here of this Provision, and are now in a condition to supply our Neighbors.

Warfam, Fune 11. The term allotted by the Conflitution of the Kingdom, for the Sellion of the Diet begins now to draw very near an end, and yet we fee northing concluded on for the Publick good, to great are the Factions and Animofities between the Deputies, and that leads them every day into fo great diforder and conjulion, that we are to far from being and while first are charinly told, that the Poles abfolute-

ble to expect from them any fober refolution for the defence of the Kingdom, that we are in a manner forced to with the Diet was broken up, to avoid thole daily quarrels that happen amongst them; and that during their meeting, and the milcheif and confuli-on that may arile thereby to them (elves, and the whole Kingdom in general. In the mean time, we difcover more and more appearance of an Invation by the Turks, who we hear now, are on their march towards our Frontiers, though at the fame time many of the Deputies of the Diet will believe nothing lefs, faying, That thefe are onely reports raifed by the reft, to oblige them to a blind confent to what, ever they would impose upon the people, under pretence of the Publick good ; however it is feared thefe people will at length difcover their error, and when they fee the Ottoman Troops lodged in their Countrey, be forced to believe, that these reports were but too true. In the interim, the Elector of Brandenburgh continues to affure his Majefty of his aff fiftance.

Genoua, July 6. The Duke of Savøy's Troofs, have taken Pieve, a place belonging to this State, and pillaged it ; a Manifesto having been published there by order of the Duke to this effect, That he will restore the place, upon reference of all differences about the Frontiers, to the Ruota of Bologna ; to which, this Senate hath answered. That they are ready to refer the decifion of this matter, to the most Chrifian and Catholick Kings; provided, This place be condition, it was in before. In the mean time this State arms apace, though we hear of leveral Propofals that have been made on both fides for accommodating of all matters before they proceed too far.

Vienna, July 3. Here have of late arrived feveral Exprelles from the Marquels de Grana, and the Governor of the Spanish Netberlands, giving His Imperial Majefty an account of the prefent posture of Affairs in those parts, and prefling his Majefty to some speedy resolution thereupon; but we cannot as yet certainly hear of any thing His Imperial Majefty hath refolved in this matter : In the mean time, it is faid; that General Montecuculi shall command an Army of 30000 Men for the lecurity of the Empires We are told, that the Emperor will make the Great Mafter of the Teutonick Order, Palatine of Hungarys We have here horfling, but uncertain reports, concern-ing the defigns of the *Turks*, the one while we are af-fured, that the Grand Viffer is on his march with a formidable Army towards *Poland*, and prefently after is again contradicted, fo that in the whole, we know not what to cycdit. Our Letters of the eighth paft, from Adrianopte tell us, that the Grand Signior was litil there, and that the Grand Vilier was at Confirm-simple, and had declared. That the Port was very ready to treat with the Crown of Poland in ordet to aff at comodation, provided they would yield and n-krains to the Grand Signior; that other wile he was obliged to march sgainit them with all the Force he could to take possession of a Countrey, which had already fubmitted it felf under his Protection; and
