Their Excellencies the Duke of Bucks, the Earl of Arlington, and the Viccount Hullifux, His Majelty of Great Britains Extraordinary Am-baffadors, having been all along lodged in the Camp from the day of their first Audience, accompanied the King in this march. Sunday night the Army camped halfe a mile from Rhonen, and the next day under the Walls of Acruhem, where the King having vifited the Prince of Conde, lying very ill of the Gout, but out of danger of his wound, and having conferred with Monfieur Turenne, the next morning he passed the Army over the Rhyne, at two or three foveral places for difpatch fake, and fo incamped that night within halfe a League of Nimmegen. The King continued there the whole day and the next night, here the King would, needs compliment the Ambaffadors, and show them the Foot, which were therefore drawn out in very great order, being cer-tainly the brayeft Body of Men, fon fo many, that has been foep, and full of vigor and briskness, as is fcarce eredible after fo much marching and haraffing. The King closed all with a regality of the featon, and an exercile of his own Regiment. This night the Amhafladors lodged at Nimmegen, which place, together with Acrnhem, Schenscance and Grave, with the flar rich Country of Betume, between the Wall and the Rhyne, are put into one Government, and given to the Count de l' Orge ; here the King, as his Army at Boxtel.

next morning, and fo marched to Grave ( fome three Leagues from Nimmegen) where the Ambalfadors lodged, the Army quartering thort of it about halfe a mile. Here the King, its faid, intends to renole the Army to monow, as well that it may have ime to joyne, after the firaglings it must needs have fuffered by reason of the very firait passages of the two last days march, as to have an account of what Monfieur Turenne and Monfieur de Chamilly doe, who are as this day invefting Boifleduc.

From the Gamp at Helwicke, a League and a half thick, at the same time Monsteur de Chamilly is said to be before Bommell; of both which places, the King thinks to have a good account in very few dyy, This night the Camp removes two Leagues farther to a place called Boxtel, a League and a half to the left-hand of Boisleduc, with intention, as is now thought, of fitting next down before Breda, and leaving Boisleduc till afterwards, to which the Rains that fell yelterday, and last night, seem to have contributed.

Ditto, July 18. We do not yet hear Creveceur or Bommell are taken, though from the former place we hear fill fhooring. This Morning the Ambaflatdors are going for Antwerp on their return home,

Antwerp, July 21. Monday the 18 Instant, the English Extraordinary Ambassadors parted from the French Camp at Boxtel, a League and a half from Beifleduc, and took their way for Antwerp in the Jung in, Jung in, Graie, July 14, Sunday morning the 9 inflam by break of day us inflam Majelly with his whole Army desamped from Zeylt, and took his way convoyed by 500 Horles, which prought them half a towalds Boilledus by the way of Aernhem, Nim-megen, &c. leaving the Duke of Luxemburgh in the cellencies proceeded to Turnhauk, where they lodg. ed, and the next day arrived at Anywerp about four About two hours after, their Exin the afternoon. cellencies fent to the Count de Monterey, who had been here for fome days, to know if it were agreeable to his Excellency, that they did make him their refpects, who by the Marquels de Mourbee ; Captain of his Excellencies Guards, returned the compliment, and appointed to meet their Excellencies at the Convent of the Carmelites, which they accordingly did. The next day their Excellencies were entertained at a very noble Dinner by Count Marcin, with the Duke de Montalto, the Prince d' Arembergh , and many other perfons of the most eminent quality of this Court, the Count de Monterey coming likewife thither. This afternoon their Excellencies difmift all the Officers of his most Christian Majesties Houshold and Guards, that attended them , after they had been all Prefented from the greatest to the least very nobly, and as they all confessed, beyond the examples of any former times; as indeed the Ambaffadors Treatment had far furpaffed that of any others, for the relpect and observance expressed to them in all circumstances, not to speak of the cost of the Enitertainment. It is thought their Excellencies may continue here for fome few days longer.
