Rye, July 17. Efterday the Joha of Dover brought in a fmall Veifel of 36 Tuns, called the Laurel Branch of Barnstable, which they refcued from a Dutch Privateer, who had feized her nine days before in her way to Newfoundland, laden with Malt, Salt, Ge.

Diver, July 21. This Morning came in here a Dutch Merchant man, homeward bound from Guinea, they having it feems not heard of any War, till they came to Beachy, and then onely of a War betwist France and Holland; whereupon the Mafter went afhoar at Scaford in Suffex., and ordered the Ship to come about into this, Road to elcape the French, of which Mr. Stock 'ale the Collector here, having had notice, fent men that pretended the Mafler was come hither, and defired 9 of his fhips Company to come to him afhoar, which they did, and were no looner out of the Ship; but the Engliff men supplyed their places, and feized the fhip as Prize; flue carriesten Guns, well built, not above two years old, and has been Trading on the Gold Coalf about feven Months; fhe has on board great flore of Hlephants Teeth, and other rich Commodities, being laded on the account of the Dutch Weff-India Company : The Mafter was flayed at seaford by the Mayor, having with him a Portmantle, and in it a very confiderable quantity of Gold.

Libbane, fune 29. Yelterday came in here a Velfel from the Ifland of Tercera, and brings newsthat there was arrived a Merchant man from Goa (which we (uddainly expect here) with advice, that the Fire is broken out again in the Ifland of Fyal, in threelcore and ten feveral places, which hath madee all the Inbabitants forfake the Ifland, and take refuge amongft their Neighbors in St. Michaels, Terceras, St. Georges, and St. Maryes, ai d they write, that the Fire hath broken out 1 kewife in the Tercerds.

Venice, July 15. On Munday lait about Sun-fer happened here a very, violent Storm, accompanied with Thunder and Hail of a very extraordinary bignel, most of the Vines hereabouts have been de-Aroyed, and great mifchief done every where in the Countrey round us. The bufinefs concerning Capt. General Morofini's Accounts cannot be as yet determined, fo that he fill remains in cuftody, though all people here are very well fatisfied that he will at length come thence with much Honour. From Adrimople we have this Account of affairs, that the Grand Signior is on his march, but that his motions are fo flow, and his defignes kept lo fecret, that hitherto it cannot be known what way he will take, though the common report still fays, that the defigne in hand is against Polan 1, and that all the feeming appearance to the contrary, and the over-tures that have been made by the Grand Visier for an accommodation with that Crown, ferve only to amuse them, that the Grand Signior may come upon them the more unexpectedly, and give them lefs time to provide for their own defence. We feem here much concerned at what hath lately paffed between the Duke of Savoy and the Republick of Genoua, ve-

ry much fearing is may occafion a Rubture between the two States, ankels timely prevented by the interposition of the neighboring Princes, who will all doubtless contribute their bettendeavors for the temoving all occasion of trouble in this part of Etrope. Notwith flanding what is faid of the Bape Ballas being ordered to come to. Sea with a Wery great Fleet of Galleys, the Malteles and State Christian Galleys continue their flation fill near the Archipelago, and do daily-much mildhief to the Turkish Nawigation. The French Amballador bath not as yet had his publick Audience, by feator his Equippage is still behind. Vienna, July 16. On Tuefday last the Prince

d' Anhalt arrived here from Berlin, with full powi er, finally to conclude the Treaty; now in hand between the Bmperor and the Elector of Brandenburgh for the defence of the Empire, this morthing was held a conference in the Palace, in prefence of his Im-perial Majefty, concerning this affair, which it is iaid, may now be fuddalnly concluded. Mete is a discourse of some Forces that the Emperor is fending from hence towards the Frontiers of the Empires to joyn with the Elector of Brandenburgh's Troops, and that they are to be Commanded by the General Montecuruli, though as yet we cannot hear that they begin to march, or that they are in any posture for do. The great trouble this Court was in upon teching of the news from Polund toncerning the deposition of the King, feems at prefent in some ealed we being now affured, that above 26 Schators, and most part of the Nobility; have folennly declared for his Majesty, which bath put a great frop to the procedure of the Faction, who had flattered them felves, that they should not have met with fo great oppolition in their delignes; It is faid that amongft others, the Bilhop of *Culme* Vice-Chancellor of the Crown, who hath always been a great promoted of the Kings Interests, hath done his Majeffy great fer vice in the prelent conjuncture, his prudent management of things having fweetende the fpirits of many of the Nobility, who by falle impressions mad been drawn in against the King; it is faid that fome Forces are to be lent hence sowards the frontiers of Silefta, to be employed as the affairs of his Majefty, of Poland may require, though after all, we hope a fhort time will let him above all the danger, the contrivance of his enemies now feems to threaten, and bring the Authors of these disturbances to the punistment they justly deferve

Danzzicke, fuly 16. The Reports we had here this week from Waifdw, conterning the Deposing of the King, begin now to vanish again, elpecially fince the arrival of out last Letters from thence, which came this day, 'Dated the 12th at Warfaw; and tell us, That the Senare had, fince the breaking up of the Dyet, unanimously concluded. That the Militia of the Kingdome should be immediately, railed, and appointed the Rendesvouz to be the 20th of the next Moneth at Sokal and Krilowka in Folhyniz, wear the River Bug: It is thought, the Bringing the Nobility thus together in Armies, is not fo much for our defence against the Turks (though perhaps
