THIS Day His Majesty came to the House of Peers, and being in His Royal Robes, seated on the Throne with the usual Solemnity, Sir Charles Dalton, Gentleman Usher of the Black Rod, was sent with a Message from His Majesty to the House of Commons, commanding their Attendance in the House of Peers; the Commons being come thither accordingly, His Majesty was pleased to give the Royal Assent to,

An Act for granting an Aid to His Majesty by a Land-Tax, to be raised in Great-Britain for the Service of the Year One Thousand Seven Hundred and Thirty One.

An Act for the further Application of the Sinking Fund, by paying off One Million of South Sea Annuities.

An Act to explain and amend an Act made in the Third Year of His Majesty's Reign, intitled, An Act for the better Regulation of Juries, so far as the same relates to the County of Middlesex.

An Act to indemnify Persons who, through Ignorance of Law, have omitted to qualify themselves for Employments or Offices, by taking the Oaths, and making and subscribing the Declaration against Transubstantiation and receiving the Sacrament; and Members of Corporations who have neglected to take the Oaths of Office; and Persons who have not read the Common Prayer, and declared their Assent and Consent to the same, according to Law, upon the Terms therein mentioned.
