WHEREAS we have received His Majesty's Royal Pleasure, that the Parliament of this Kingdom, which now stands prorogued to Thursday the Twenty Second Day of this Instant April, should be further prorogued to Thursday the Second Day of September next; We do therefore hereby publish and declare, That the said Parliament be, and accordingly the said Parliament is hereby further prorogued to Thursday the Second Day of September next: Whereof the Lords Spiritual and Temporal, and the Commons in this present Parliament, are to take Notice accordingly.

Hague, April 24, N. S. The Assembly of the States of the Province of Holland continues fixed for To-morrow, the greatest Part of the Members being already arrived. Those of Guelderland are to assemble this Day, and some of the Deputies that were here are gone to assist at their Assembly. M. Hurgronje, one of the Plenipotentiaries from their High Mightinesses at the Congress of Soissons, arrived here last Sunday; and will, immediately after his having made his Report to the States, go into Zealand. Sir Cyril Wych, his Majesty's Envoy Extraordinary, to the Hanse Towns, arrived here the 22d Instant: He proposes leaving this Place To-morrow on his Way to Hambourg. By the changing of the Garrisons, two Battallions of Swiss are come hither this Day to relieve the Guards, who have been here these Fourteen Years, and will leave this Place the 26th to march to Maestricht, where they are to be garisoned for three Years.
