Berlin, May 26, N. S.

**F**IVE Regiments of Foot of two Battalions each, and three Regiments of Horse, with a new raised Squadron of Hussars, are come hither in order to be reviewed on Monday next the 28th Instant. On Wednesday last their Prussian Majesties came hither, as did also the Duke Regent of Wirtemberg, the Prince and Princes of Bevern, and the Prince their Son; and they were saluted by three Rounds of the Cannon upon the Ramparts.

Hague, June 1, N. S. The States of Holland have been assembled since Wednesday last; but the Grand Pensionary's ill State of Health not permitting him to attend at the Assembly, they separated this Day. Some of the Directors of the East India Company have been here these five or six Days, on Account of the two Ships taken and released by the Algerines the last Year: The several Chambers cannot agree upon the Damage suffered by the Company on that Occasion, and they apply themselves again to the States General for having that Matter settled by fixing the said Damage. 'Tis reported here, that the Duke of Lorraine will come into Holland within a few Days. Baron Keppel designing to go next Week to his Government of Bergenopzoom, the Marquels de Fenelon, the French Ambassadour, proposes to go with him, and from that Place to take a Turn to Zealand.

Whitehall, Treasury Chambers, May 11, 1731.

The Right Honourable the Lords Commissioners of His Majesty's Treasury, pursuant to the Power given to them by Act of Parliament in this Behalf, have been pleased to order and appoint, that the Monies to be contributed for Tickets in the Lottery for Eight Hundred Thousand Pounds, are to be paid in to the Bank of England to the Hands of the Cashiers, who are appointed Receivers thereof, by two equal Payments, that is to say, one Moiety of the Monies so to be contributed to be paid on or before the First Day of June, 1731, and the other Moiety on or before the

Twentieth Day of August 1731. And all Persons, Bodies Politick and Corporate, who shall become Purchasers of the said Tickets, are to take Notice hereof, and to make their Payments accordingly, under the Penalties and Forfeitures by the said Act inflicted in case of Failure thereof.

Admiralty-Office, April 30, 1731.

The Lords Commissioners of the Admiralty being sensible of the Poor Circumstances that many Officers of the Navy do leave their Families in after their Death; and having applied their Thoughts to find out some Provision for relieving the Necessities of the Widows and Children of such Poor Officers; and being of Opinion, that nothing will so effectually answer so good a Purpose, as a voluntary Agreement and Consent of the Commission and Warrant Officers of the Navy, to allow of an Abatement of Three Pence in the Pound, out of their Personal Pay and Half Pay, and that the Fund arising thereby, as well as such other Benefactions which well disposed Persons may at any Time contribute, be put under the Management of a Body of Men incorporated together by a Royal Charter, to be applied to the Relief of Poor Widows and Children as aforesaid: In order therefore that the Officers of the Navy may be apprized of the Nature of the intended Corporation, and that it may be known, whether they are in general willing to consent to the proposed Abatement; their Lordships do hereby give Notice, that Printed Schemes are lodged at this, and the Navy-Office, as also with the Commissioner of the Navy, or Chief Naval Officer at Deptford, Woolwich, Chatham, Sheerness, Deal, Portsmouth, Plymouth, Harwich, and Kinsale, where all such Commission and Warrant Officers, as are so minded, may go and peruse the same; and such of them as are willing to allow of the Abatement proposed, are desired to subscribe their Names thereto.
