The Right Honourable the Lords Commissioners of His Majesty's Treasury, pursuant to the Power given to them by Act of Parliament in this Behalf, have been pleased to order and appoint, that the Monies to be contributed for Tickets in the Lottery for Eight Hundred Thousand Pounds, are to be paid in to the Bank of England to the Hands of the Cashiers, who are appointed Receivers thereof, by two equal Payments, that is to say, one Moiety of the Monies so to be contributed to be paid on or before the First Day of June, 1731, and the other Moiety on or before the Twentieth Day of August 1731. Admiralty-Office, April 30, 1731.

The Lords Commissioners of the Admiralty being sensible of the Poor Circumstances that many Officers of the Navy do leave their Families in after their Death; and having applied their Thoughts to find out some Provision for relieving the Necessities of the Widows and Children of such Poor Officers; and being of Opinion, that nothing will so effectually answer so good a Purpose, as a voluntary Agreement and Consent of the Commission and Warrant Officers of the Navy, to allow of an Abatement of Three Pence in the Pound, out of their Personal Pay and Half Pay, and that the Fund arising thereby, as well as such other Benefactions which well disposed Persons may at any Time contribute, be put under the Management of a Body of Men incorporated together by a Royal Charter, to be applied to the Relief of Poor Widows and Children as aforesaid: In order therefore that the Officers of the Navy may be apprized of the Nature of the intended Corporation, and that it may be known, whether they are in general willing to consent to the proposed Abatement; their Lordships do hereby give Notice, that Printed Schemes are lodged at this, and the Navy-Office, as also with the Commissioner of the Navy, or Chief Naval Officer at Deptford, Woolwich, Chatham, Sheerness, Deal, Portsmouth, Plymouth, Harwich, and Kingsale, where all such Commission and Warrant Officers, as are so minded, may go and peruse the same; and such of them as are willing to allow of the Abatement proposed, are desired to subscribe their Names thereto.
