THE King of Morocco has given Orders for his Army to take the Field and march towards those Countries and Places that have not yet submitted to him, several of which have put themselves into a Posture of Defence. There has been a Discovery made of a Conspiracy amongst the Blacks to dethrone the King, headed by Alcajde Hayany, the most considerable Person amongst them, who flying for Protection to a Man of Répute for Sanctity Myley Tuim, was by him carried to the King, upon whose Intercession for him the King answered he would pardon the Offence against himself, but must consult the Judges upon the Treason against the Nation, who gave their Opinion, that any Person that should attempt the King's Life, and endeavour to embroil the State, ought to be put to Death; so he was immediately executed. Several Letters were afterwards found amongst his Papers from the Basha of Tangier, encouraging him to rebel, and promising him Assistance both of Troops and Ammunition. There are 50 Alcajdes gone to Tangier to seize the Basha, who, it is thought, will follow the Basha of the Blacks,

Whitehall, June 8.
