had justly acquired the efteem of a person of great worth and benor.

Stockholm, June 12. 'Tis thought that Queen Christina, who is fundenly expected here, will not receive the fatisfaction the promises her self from this Court, the Diet being deferred which was the Principal cause of her journey, besides the difficulty the will finde in obtaining a permission of the exercise of her Religion according to her defires. The Chevalier de Treion, the French Ambassador here, has at latt with much difficulty fent away for France, the Box y of the famous Philoiopher and Mathematician René des Cartes, wrappes up in Copper, who about twelve years fince died in this City.

Paris, July 16. Yesterday Monsieur de Villeroy endezvoring to Apologize in Council for the City of Lyons, and particularly for the Provost of the Merchants (who lies under a fulpition of abetting the attempt upon Lanchenu ) was by all the Assembly, commanded by order from the King, to move no further in the business. The A chisshop of this City afterwards undertaking the fame caule, received the fame complement, which he lo ill referred, that he was immediately leaving the Council, but that the King sent to him to keep his place. Several of the chief Citizens have been cited to the Court, and the Plovost summoned by found of Trumper, but not appearing, his goods are already put to fale; neither is the Kings Lieutenant, in that City, free from suspition of being a complice in the fact. The Sieur de Rochefort, 2 companion of the late Sieur del Campe, is condemned by the Court of Moneys, to pay for his fine 3000 Livres, and to entertain 2 Company five years at Sea upon his own expence.

A small Rebellion is started up in the further parts of this Kingdom, where one Andigeau is returned from the Pyrcnean Mountains, whither he formerly fled for fecurity, and has put himself, in the head of a great number of discontented persons, passing by the Lourde to St. Severe, not far from Aix, declaring against the Gabelles, and as we are told from Bourdeaux, hanging up all the Gabellers they can meet with, pretending to act for the Kings service.

Hague, July 20. The Sieur Appleb on having received a new character of Envoyé Extraordinary from his Master the King of Sweden, defires Audience, which is yet deferred till it be resolved how he shall be received, whither at his House, or onely met at the bottom of the Stales 3 at the same time the Swede offers his Mediation here, we are not without elamors from Wessel, and other parts of the Frontiers, of their great arming towards Westphalia, where the Bishop of Munfter begins again to stir, divers parties of his Horse having already embodied, which gives much jealousie here, inso-much, as we have crieted the Garrisons of Swell, Deventer, and other confiderable Frontier places to be doubled; and now we are like possibly to have other work for our Land-And therefore those lately sent off with foldiers nearer home. cur Fleer, upon pretended deligns of invading England, are recal ed, and Colonel Iterfum is already arrived in Zealand with a great part of them 3 loas by that means our Fleet may be brought to want its just complements: And therefore all old ways of getting men failing, we are trying a new one, which is by certain Deputies empowred by the Generality, to fend to the several Towns to raile us so many men of those they have idle and imemployed among them, which God knows are found in too great numbers every where. How this project will take, is doubted !

Thursday last prived in Zealand a Galliot from the Fleet, with the body of Cap. Claes, one of our beit Scamen, who cied on board. De Witt is chosen Curator of the University of Beiden. They write from Denma k, that A imiral Adelaer arrived at Elfenour, June 27, with 9 Holland Men of War, and some Naval provision, for the fitting out their Fleet.

Hese are to give notice to all whom it may concern, that His Majesties Commissioners appointed to take care of all Sick and Wounded Seamen. &c. and to secure all Prisoners of Warr, Do for the future sit in the Scar-Chamber Lodgings in Westminster, at their assual times, viz. On Tuessay, Thursday, and Saturday in every meck, and oftner if occasion be.

The Juflices of the Peace for the County of Effer, at the Quarter Sessions lately held as Brentwood, having certified that besides Colchester, many other Townes and Villages in the faid County are Visited with the Sickness; It hath been therefore thought fit, and is ordered, that the Affiges intended to have been held at B entwood for the faid County the 6th of August next, shall not be held.

Legorn, July 7. Letters of the 23 past from Tunis, tell us of the Death of the Old King there, five daies before which, the wifer part of their Council fearing a disturbance in the Interregne, obtained a new one to be chosen, an old Bachelor of above fixty, particularly well affected to the Englith Nation, whose Articles he immediately confirmed with his S.al. Howeve, he differs in his Rules of Policy from his Predecessions, having already rethrained the liberty heretofore granted for exportation of Corn. That a person was arrived there from the French King to effect 2 Peace, which yet that King would not hear of. That the Corières of that place have taken a French ship for Venice laden with Brimstone. That they had news from Tripoly, the netable Ofman Baffa of that place was dead.

Harwich, July 12. Besi les the late attempt of the Duch to Land at St. Offths, where about 39 of them were takens of which, we formerly gave you an account. Yester ay another of their Shallops endeavored to Land about the Nage, but finding upon two or three tryals, that the Muskettiers from the thore were fomething rude in their entertainment, they retited in much haft to their fleet, who after they hat been some bours under fail, are again returned to their former station; where we wish they may continue till ours, which is now complear

and vigorous, come and bid them welcome.

Margate, July 13. The last night the Little Mary coming from Often 1, met between Newport and Dunkirk, with a Vestel of fix Guns and 70 Men, belonging to Folin Eversfon, Admiral of Zealand, laden with Anchors, Cables, and other provision for the Dutch flet ; and after a B oadfide or two, took her, and brought her to Broadstairs, where she landed the prisoners: But being discovered by four enfive Dutch Men of War, and two Gilliots, which were then in our Road, and had made some shot in to the Town, they prefently made after her ; but the I ittle Mary getting the wind of them, recovered the Downs, the Pize ran her self en ground at Broadstairs, to whom the Datch sent their Gallice Hoys, who plaid on her with their small Gins, and manned our their Boars with small thor, thinking to have brought her off; but they received such peals of fliot from some foot that were immediately drawn thicher, that with a visible loss, they were forced to leave off their attempt, and return again to Sea.

Amongst other persons brought over from Oftend by the Little Wary, was Jo. Desborough, formerly known by the title of Mojor General, who came over upon pretence of lubmitting himself to His Mejefties mercy according to the late Pioclamation; however remains committed p isoner in Dover Cafte, by o der of the Earl of Middleton, His Majeffies Lieutenant General in Kens, until His Me Jeities pleasure be

further known.

Plymouth, July 12. This day the John and Mary, the Hopewell, and the Parinership of London, arrived here from Malaga 5, they left Tangier 29 days fince, but tell no news of De Beaufort fince he came to Lubon. A French man of Wx came up with them off Scilly, but durst not engage them.

Harwich, July 14. The Dutch lie in the same station as formerly, very quiet, with their small Boats and Vessels that attend them; we cannot perceive they thir out of late, though tometimes they weigh Anchor in the Flood, and come to Ar-

chor in the fame places again at Ebb.

Whitehal, July 15. This day arrived a Trumpet from the States of Holland, who came over frem Calais, in the Dover Packet-Boat, with a Letter to His Majesty, that the States have taken order for the Embalming the Body of Sir William Berkley, which they have placed in the Chappel of the great Church at the Hague; a civility they protess to ow to his Corps, in respect of the Q above f his Person, the Greatness of his Command, and of the high Conrage and Valor be thewed in the late Engagement; eff in His Majelly to fignifi: His pleasure about the further disposal of it.
