THE following Address has been presented to His Majesty by Sir William Yonge, Recorder of the Town of Tiverton in Devon. Which Address His Majesty was pleased to receive very graciously.

To the King's most Excellent Majesty.

May it please your Majesty,

WE your Majesty's most dutiful and loyal Subjects the Mayor, Burgesses, Assistants, Clergy, and other Inhabitants of the Town of Tiverton in Devon, being deeply sensible of your Majesty's great Grace and Favour to us, do most humbly beseech your Majesty to accept of our most hearty Thanks for your Majesty's Royal and most munificent Bounty, vouchsafed to the Poor Sufferers by Fire in this Town.
