Berlin, August 18, N. S.

THE Company that went to Sonnebourg on Tuesday last (except the King of Prussia himself, who arrived only this Afternoon) came back last Night. The Interview between the King and the Prince Royal was on Wednesday last, about Three a Clock in the Afternoon; after some Discourse they embraced. It is not yet said when the Prince is to leave Custrin, but it is generally thought it will be at the King's Return from Magdebourg, whither his Majesty intends to go in eight or ten Days; in the mean while new Equipages and all other Necessaries will be provided for his Royal Highness.

Dresden, Aug. 18, N. S. Letters from Berlin bring Advice, that the King of Prussia set out on Wednesday the 15th Instant from thence for Sonnebourg, to install the Margrave Charles Great Master of the Order of St. John; and that in his Way he made a Visit to the Prince Royal at Custrin, whom he embraced tenderly, and staid with his Royal Highness above an Hour; that afterwards his Majesty declared the Prince to be at Liberty, and that the Foreign Ministers would oblige him if they went to see his Royal Highness.

Berlin, Aug. 21, N. S. As Apartments are preparing at the Castle for the Reception of

the Prince Royal, it is not doubted but his Royal Highness will be here in a very little Time. M. Seckendorff set out Yesterday for Brunswick, where he will stay a few Days before he goes to Cassel. His Prussian Majesty went this Afternoon to Potsdam; he receives the Sacrament there on Sunday next, and the Tuesday or Wednesday following he goes to Magdebourg. M. Ginkel, Envoy from the States General, having obtained Leave to go home to settle his private Affairs, sets out To-morrow. He takes Brunswick in his Way, having a Commission from his Masters to compliment on their Part, the Duke of Wolfenbittel upon his Succession to those Dominions.

Cassel, Aug. 27, N. S. Count Seckendorff, Minister from the Emperor at the Court of Berlin, is expected here in a few Days. The Landgrave of Hesse Darmstadt, with the Hereditary Prince his Son, arrived here the 24th, and this Day is expected the Prince of Waldeck, with the Duke of Birckenfeldt.
