N Express is just now arrived from Barcelona, with Letters of the 13th Instant from Sir Charles Wager to Mr. Keene, his Britannick Majesty's Minister Plenipotentiary at this Court, acquainting him, that the Day before the Marquess de Mari came to an Anchor in that Bay with six Men of War; and that Admiral Cornejo, with the rest of the Squadron, was then in Sight, the Gallies having been fent out to tow him in, as they did the Marquess de Mari. Sir Charles Wager expected the Fleets would be ready to fail in three Days for Italy. This Day about Four in the Afternoon, the Infante Don Carlos fet out from this City, with a numerous Retinue, in order to take Possession of his States in Italy: He was accompanied three Leagues out of Town by the Prince and Princess of Asturias, and the Infante Don Phelipe. All the Foreign Ministers and the principal Nobility were at the Palace to pay their Respects to his Highness, and wish him a happy Jour-

Berlin, O.E. 27, N. S. On Sunday last M. Gromkau returned from Crossen, whither his Prussian Majesty had sent him to compliment the King of Poland in his Passage through that Place for Poland, with Orders for defraying the said King's Expences during his Stay there. His Polish Majesty lay there on Wednesday Night last, and proceeded the next Morning on his Journey. The Differences with Poland about a Fray that happened on the Frontiers, are terminated by a Convention signed at Dresden between Count Truchses, his Prussian Majesty's Minister, and the Chancellor Lipski; and it is said the Ratifications

were exchanged at Crossen. M. Ehzenerona, who is charged with the Swedish Assairs at this Court, has desired his Prussian Majesty, in the Name of the King his Master, to joyn his good Offices to those of the King of Sweden, in favour of the Duke of Birckenseld's Pretensions to the Dutchy of Deux Ponts; and it is said, that his Prussian Majesty has already sent proper Orders to his Ministers at Vienna and Ratisbon concerning that Affair. M. Lewenvolde, Minister from the Czarina, has put off his Journey to Vienna till the Beginning of next Week. M. Seckendorsf arrived here on Tuesday last from Cassel. This Evening his Prussian Majesty returned to Wusterhausen.
