THE 2d Instant a long Conference was held at the Palace ; after which several Messengers were dispatched to the Ministers of his Imperial Majesty who are residing at divers Courts in the Empire. The Aulick Council at War have not yet expedited the Circular Letters for the Reduction of the Imperial Troops, of which Mention has been made. It is now even said, that this Reduction will not take Place so soon as was thought, since we continue with the same Diligence as heretofore to raise Recruits to compleat the Imperial Regiments. Upon the Representations and Instances of the Elector of Mentz and of the four associated Circles, the Emperour has resolved to cause a Regulation to be made concerning the March of the Troops, in which the daily Allowance for Soldiers will be fixed upon an equal Foot, and conformable to the Constitutions of the Empire, in order to prevent all Disputes and Complaints ; and it is assured that the Count de Kuffitein will be charged with the Commission of presenting this Resolution to his Electoral Highness. It is said that the Minister of Genoa at this Court has desired a new Reinforcement of Imperial Troops, in order

to be better enabled to subdue the Rebels of Corsica : It is also said, that he has complained to the Minister of the Emperour against some neighbouring Nations, for supplying the Rebels with Stores of Provisions and Ammunition.

Paris, Aug. 21, N. S. The Queen has named the Count de Tessè, her Gentleman of the Horse, to go and compliment the Infante Don Carlos upon the Frontiers, and he is to set out immediately with the Duke de Tallard. The King has been pleased to confer the Government of Fort Louis on the Marquess de Rottelin, the Income of which is reduced from 12000 Livres a Year to 7000. On the 19th the Marquess de Castelar, the Grandees of Spain, and the Knights of the Golden Fleece, went to compliment the young Queen Dowager of Spain on occasion of the Festival of St. Elizabeth, whose Name the Queen of Spain bears, and they had the Honour to kiss her Hand. The same Day the Imperial Minister gave a magnificent Entertainment at Supper to all the Foreign Ministers, and several Persons of Distinction, on occasion of the Festival of the Emperess's Name ; and there was afterwards a Ball.

By the last Letters from Mr. Keene, His Majesty's Minister Plenipotentiary at the Court of Spain, there is Advice, that

the

the King of Spain has nominated the Marquês de Montejo to be his Ambaffador to His Majesty, and that he was accordingly preparing for his Journey to England. This Day Letters came in from Sir Charles Wager, dated at Leghorn the 26th of last Month, O. S. which give an Account, that every thing relating to the Introduction of the Spanish Garrisons into Tuscany being finished to the Satisfaction of all the Parties concerned, he was getting under Sail with His Majesty's Squadron under his Command, in order to return home: And Mr. Skinner, His Majesty's Consul at Leghorn, in his Letter dated the next Day, says, that they were out of Sight that Morning, and though the Wind was not very favourable, the Weather being good, they would make their Way homeward. Before Sir Charles Wager left Leghorn, he sent a Compliment to the Grand Duke at Florence, and an Excuse for not attending him in Person, on account of the advanced Season's making it necessary for him to hasten his Departure home. The Lord Vere Beauclerc went with this Message to the Grand Duke, by whom his Lordship was very graciously received.

On Sunday the 7th Instant Major General Sutton, His Majesty's Envoy Extraordinary to the King of Sweden as Landgrave of Hesse-Cassel, embarked at Rotterdam on board His Majesty's Yacht the William and Mary, and arrived at Greenwich on Saturday last in the Evening, and came to London the next Morning, and waited immediately on their Majesties, who received him very graciously. Yesterday he waited on his Royal Highness the Prince of Wales.
