The Horse taken from the said Wyld, was a Black Gelding, about Fourteen Hands high, one white Foot behind, a small white Snip down his Face, and the Great Coat was a light Shag, with two Capes, the upper one faced with Plush somewhat lighter than the Coat.

ed in such villanous and wicked Actions, is pleased to promise His most gracious Pardon, to any one of them, who shall discover his Accomplice or Accomplices, (except the Person who fired at the said Samuel Lenton) so as they, or any of them, be apprehended and convicted thereof.
