Truro, Aug. 15. Ixvery confiderable French men of War are lately palled to the Eastward, and we have advice here that they have taken a Dutch man of War of good force.

Hull, Aug. 17. From Scarborough we have advice of three Dutch Smacks taken off of the Eems by the Boat of the Speedwel Privateer, and fent into Leith. The Dutch Capers very much infest these Coasts, and have of late taken leveral fmall (tragling Veffels.

Savona, July 30. Here is lately arrived Signior Durazzo with fix Gallies and two other small men of war belonging to Genoua, to watch the motions of the Duke of Savey, who is now declared our Enemy ; and farther, to fecure the Inhabitants all along the River Ponent, from any furprize of the Enemy. In the mean time feveral hoftilities daily pafs on both fides, though as yet without any confiderable advantage to either. From Turin they tell us of the great preparations that are making there for the bringing a confiderable Army into the Field, fo that there feems but finali appearance of a composure of whele matters.

Genoua, Aug. 10. The feventh inftant Te Deum was lung in all the Churches here , for the Victory our Forces lately obtained over those of the Duke of upon which our Troops that are quartered there, im-Savoy at Castello Vecchio, a small place up in the Mountains, and the next day were brought hither about 200 Prilone, as ngit which were fome per fore sois quality. Ratisbonne, Aug. 4. On Munday last was finally concluded the Treaty for the publick fecurity and general defence of the Empire, a work of many years, and which upon that account, occasions here the greater fatisfaction now, the faid Treaty baving paffed the Three Colledges, viz: That of the Electors, that of the Princes, and laftly, that of the Imperial Free Towns, is now to be prefented to the Emperor for his final approbation thereof; fo that it is thought the feveral Circles will begin to make those preparations which by this Treaty they are obliged to. Yesterday the Dyet likewife resolved that an Order should be forthwith published, strictly prohibiting any Leavies to be made in the Empire for any forreign Prince or State; and it is farther faid, that all the subjects of the Empire, who are at present abroad in any forreign fervice, are to be called home, under pain of confication of their Estates, and other fevere punishments. The Prince, of Baden Dourlack revere punitments. The Prince, of Baten Douritate is appointed Velt Mateféhal General of the Army of the ten Circles, Duke Maximilian of Berneral Gene-tal of the Artillery, and Duke tenbergb, General of the Constant of the Army ac-cordingly take their oaths of fuelity very fuddainly before the Dyet.

Gronningen, Ang. 20. The Enemy have lately raifed a new Battery, and planted 14 great Guns on its from whence they have continued shooting for two days together, with great violence, having quite beaten down one of our Gates, which was immediately filled up with Earth , and in the mean time we are likewise about making an other Battery, and that very high ; by means of which, we hope to do fuch execution upon the Enemy, as to make them retire farther off, however they still continue their Mines, and leem to have intentions of Storming the place, but as yet we cannot perceive where they intend to fall on. Several of the ordinary Soldiers come daily runing over hither, out of the Enemies Camp, complaining of their hard Service, and want of Provifions; but our Governor not thinking it lafe to keep them here, being in all 400 Men, hath embarked them in feveral Veffels for *Holland*, We fay here we have killed the Enemy abundance of Men, and amongst others the Count de Benshem, the Ligutenant Collonel Nagel, and several other principal Officers, so that we hope they will be at last sorced to quit the Siege

Amsterdam, Aug. 22. On Saturday last about 200 French Horle appeared not far from Hinderdam, mediately drew out, and charged them, the Enemy meeting them with the like refolution, fo that they had fome little skirmish, though without doing a-ny thing confiderable on either fide.
