- An Act for granting and continuing to His Majefty an additional Duty on Beer, Ale, Strong Waters, Wine, To-bacco, and other Goods and Marchandizes therein mentioned.
- An Act for granting to His Majefy a further additional Duty on Wine, Silk, jurther additional Duty on Wine, Silk, Hops, China, Earthen, Japanned or Lackcred Ware, and Vinegar; and also a Tax of Four Shillings in the Pound on all Salaries, Profits of Em-ployments, Fees and Pensions, to be applied to pay an Interest of Five Pounds per Cent. per Annum, for the Sum of Three Thousand Pounds, and towards the Discharge of the Said Principal Sum.
