**T**HE Week before last Don Joseph de Miranda, one of the first Gentlemen of the Bedchamber to the Infant Don Carlos, came hither to make his most Serene Highness's Compliments to the Great Duke; by whom he was very graciously received, and was lodged and entertained in the Palace during his Stay here. The Great Duke and the Electress Dowager Palatine expressed to him the Joy they had upon the Prince's safe Arrival at Leghorn, and their Desire of seeing him soon at Florence. About the same Time the Duke d'Airon passed through this Place, in his way to Parma, who was likewise sent by the Infant Don Carlos to compliment the Dutchess Dowager Dorothea in his Name. On Monday Morning, the 13th Instant, an Express arrived here from Leghorn, with an Account of his most Serene Highness's being fallen ill there of the Small Pox; but by the Accounts received from Time to Time, the Distemper has been all along attended with the most favourable Symptoms possible; and the 10th Day being over and no Fever returned, the Physicians who attend his most Serene Highness have given their Opinion that he is out of all Danger.

*Hague, Feb. 8, N. S.* Yesterday in the Evening arrived from Zealand the Resolution of the States of that Province to agree to the Accession of this Republick to the Treaty of Vienna. The

And as a further Encouragement, His Majesty is also pleased to promise a Reward of Five Hundred Pounds to any one of them, or to any other Person or Persons who shall make such Discovery as aforesaid, to be paid on the Conviction of the Offender or Offenders.
