Petersbourg, January 29, O. S.

Yesterday being the Anniversary of the Czarina's Birth-Day, all the Foreign Ministers and Persons of Distinction were invited to dine at Court; in the Afternoon all the Troops that are in Garrison here, were exercised on the Ica, before the Palace; and General Count Munich, with Part of the Forces, attacked some Works which were made on the River, to divert her Majesty. In the Evening there was a Ball. The Appearance at Court was very grand, the Lords and Ladies being most magnificently dressed.

Berlin, Feb. 22. The Duke of Lorrain, whose Indisposition it seems was very slight, is expected this Day at Potzdam, and great Preparations are making for his Reception and Entertainment.

WHEREAS William Curling, Commander of an English Ship from London, in the Year 1722, on his Return from Archangel, stranded at a Place called Hove in the Island Ferro, and thereupon went to Copenhagen in the Year 1723, where he in the Month of August obtained the King of Denmark's Permission to ship off his Cargo from the said Place in an English Bottom, the same consisted of a great Quantity of Tar, which he had given in Possession to Mr. John Bernt Sorensen, with Orders not to deliver any thereof without Orders from himself, Owners, or Merchants; and since that Time, neither Capt. Curling, or others for him, have concerned themselves in this Affair, and the Tar for want of House-Room laid in the open Field, being a great Quantity, and could not otherwise be provided for, sundry of the faulty Barrels, by the Heat of the Sun, have leaked out, the Hull of the Ship, and every thing belonging to it, was soon after his Departure broken to Pieces, and driven away by a violent Storm; and as the above-mentioned John Bernt Sorensen is since deceased in the Spring 1731, his Heirs do therefore give Notice, that in case Capt.
