A PROCLAMATION.

For apprehending and securing the Persons of William Burroughs Esq; and William Squire.

HEREAS we have received Information, that William Burroughs
Efq; one of the Committee entruited with the Management of the Affairs of the Charitable Corporation for

sons that shall pass or endeavour to pass beyond the Seas; and if they shall discover the said William Burroughs and William Squire, or either of them, then to cause them and either of them to be aprehendended and secured, and to give Notice thereof as aforesaid. And we do hereby strictly charge and command all our loving Subjects, (as they will answer the contrary at their Perils) that they do not any ways conceal, but do discover the said William Burroughs and William Squire, to the End that they and each of them may be secured and proceeded against according to Law. And for the Encouragement of all Persons to be diligent and careful in endeavouring to discover and apprehend the said William Burroughs and William Squire, we do hereby further declare, That whosever shall discover and apprehend the faid William Burroughs and William Squire, or either of them, and shall bring them or either of them before some Justice of Peace or chief Magistrate, as aforesaid, shall have and receive as a Reward for each of them being so apprehended and brought before some Justice of Peace or chief Magistrate, as aforelaid, the Sum of Five Hundred Pounds. Which faid Sums of Five Hundred Pounds our Commissioners of our Treasury are hereby required and directed to pay accordingly.
