*Florence, March 15, N. S.*

**O**N the 22d of last Month, the Infante Don Carlos being perfectly recovered of the Small Pox, went from Leghorn to Pisa, where his most Serene Highness stay'd till the 3d Instant. From thence he came to P'Inbrogiana, a Country Seat belonging to the Grand Duke about fifteen Miles from this Place. His Highness in his Way hither was most magnificently entertained at Dinner by the Marquess Riccardi at Castel Pucci, whither the Council of State went to pay their Compliments to his Highness; as did likewise a great Number of the Nobility and Gentry. On Sunday the 9th Instant in the Afternoon, he made his Entry here by St. Frediano's Gate, in a Coach and Six, accompanied by the Count de St. Estevan and Prince Corsini, and was saluted by a Discharge of the Guns of the Castle. He was followed by five Coaches more, with the Gentlemen of his Court, and about 80 of his Body Horse Guards. A Company of Grenadiers, a Troop of the Great Duke's Cuirassiers, and some of the Halberdier Guards, attended on the Prince, as also the greater Part of the Nobility in their Coaches, from the said Gate to the Cathedral Church, where his most Serene Highness was received at the Door by the Archbishop and the Senate. Te Deum was sung, and the Guns of the Castle saluted him a second Time. From thence the Prince went to the Palace, where he was received by the Electress Dowager Palatine at the Antichamber of his Apartment, and after the Compliment was paid, the Electress retired into her own Apartment. Then the Prince paid her a Visit, and she received him in her Antichamber, where a great Number of Ladies of

the first Rank were present. The Electress then conducted the Prince to the Great Duke, who received him most graciously, and complimented him on his late Arrival, in the Presence of the Count de St. Estevan, Don Lelio Caraffa, the Prince Corsini, the Duke of Turfis, the Baron Ricasoli, the Count Bardi, the Marquess Guadagni, and several others of the Nobility. The Ceremony lasted about an Hour, when his most Serene Highness retired to his own Apartment. The Great Duke's, as also the Prince's Antichambers, were crowded with the Nobility and Gentry. At Night the Prince supped in Publick, and his chief Ministers were entertained by the Great Duke at Supper. On Monday Morning his most Serene Highness received the Compliments of Congratulation upon his Arrival here from the Ministry, the Senate, and the Nobility, and at Night two Couriers were dispatched to Vienna and Rome, to acquaint the Emperour and the Pope with his Highness's Arrival; and Wednesday in the Evening the Marquess de St. Croix was dispatched to Seville, to inform their Catholick Majesties of his most Serene Highness's Reception here. Illuminations and Bonfires, with other publick Demonstrations of Joy have been continued for three Nights successively.
