Petersbourg, March 18, O. S.

LAST Saturday Baron Mardefeldt, Minister from the King of Prussia, had an Audience of her Czarish Majesty, and delivered to her a Letter from the King his Master, notifying the Prince Royal of Prussia's being betrothed to the Princess of Bevern. By the last Advices from Constantinople we are informed, that the Turks having beaten the Persians near Ardebil, the Sophy had made new Proposals of Peace, which it was thought the Turks will accept, in case the Persians will consent that they should keep Tauris and Ardebil. The Great Chancellor Count Golofkin arrived here some Days ago from Moscow.

Vienna, April 5, N. S. About the Middle of next Week the Duke of Lorraine is expected at Selewitz, a Country Seat belonging to the Great Chancellor, where that Minister is to entertain him splendidly, and to accompany his Royal Highness hither after the Easter Holidays. M. Jacquin, the Envoy of Lorraine, is come back from Breslau, where he waited upon the Duke his Master.

Berlin, April 12, N. S. There are Advices from Halberstadt, that two Officers belonging to the Troops of Hesse Cassel have been taken up and put in Arrest by Order of his Prussian Majesty, as they were travelling

through that Town. This Proceeding is grounded on the same Reasons which made his Prussian Majesty lately confine a Lieutenant Colonel in the service of the Elector of Cologne. Major General Count Schulenburg, who was sent to Vienna to notify to their Imperial Majesties the Conclusion of the Marriage between the Prince Royal and the Princess of Bevern, is returned hither. A few Days ago, A Duel was fought between Major General Dockum, and M. de Wolde a Lieutenant of his own Regiment; the General was shot in the Belly, of which Wound he died last Night. Here is a Report since this Morning, that the Elector of Mentz died at Breslau on the 5th Instant; but as we might have had that Advice much sooner, few People give Credit to it.

Hague, April 18, N. S. By Advices which arrived last Night from Cologne and those Parts, the Elector of Mentz was very ill and past all Hopes of Recovery. The same Advices add, that the Elector of Cologne has ordered all the Subjects of the King of Prussia, going through his Dominions, of whatever Condition they may be, to be arrested and secured, by way of Reprisal for a Lieutenant Colonel in his Service, who passing through Berlin in his way to Pomerania on his private Affairs, was arrested there, on Account of some Prussian Officers who are detained in the Country of Munster, for inlisting Men there.

And as a further Encouragement for such Discovery, His Majesty is also pleased to promise to any of them, or to any other Person or Persons who shall discover the Murderers, or either of them, so as he or they may be apprehended and convicted thereof, a Reward of Fifty Pounds for each Person who shall be apprehended and convicted, to be paid on the Conviction of such Offender or Offenders.
